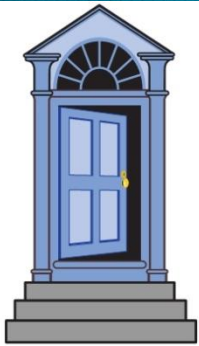

- ▶ Local court records
- ▶ Relatively minor crimes
  - Drunk and disorderly
  - Obscene language
  - Assault
  - Wife/child desertion
  - Breaking and entering
  - No visible (lawful) means of support
- Check out other court records too!

- ▶ In September 1886 Maria summoned Adam for maintenance at Ipswich where he was ordered to pay 10s a week. His brother became surety for him but Adam absconded.
- ▶ Maria Johnston and John Bolton arrived in Beenleigh in January 1887 and lived in tents along the Southport railway line.
- ▶ In June 1887 Adam Johnston was arrested for disorderly conduct.
- ▶ On 24 October 1887 Maria summoned Adam for assault and the following day Adam stole his wife's sewing machine.
- ▶ On 3 November 1887 Maria summoned Adam for maintenance and he was advised to pay 12s a week.
- ▶ Adam was charged with wife desertion and bound to pay 12s a week and two sureties of £15 each or in default six months imprisonment.
- ▶ After he was sent to gaol, Bolton and Maria moved to Pimpama and were living there in January 1888.
- ▶ The Rev Mr Martin claimed that Adam was living with another woman and that he was not quite right in his mind.

## ALLEGED ARSON CASE.

At the South Brisbane Police Court yesterday, before Messrs. W. Yaldwyn, P.M., T. Austin, and E. Allen, J.P., a middle-aged man named John Finn appeared in custody charged with wilfully and unlawfully setting fire to a dwelling-house in Hampstead-street, Woolloongabba, last Sunday morning. Sub-inspector Geraghty conducted the prosecution. Constable Coman stated that at about 7.30 on the morning of the 30th instant he saw defendant in Balasclava-street, Woolloongabba, when he said to him, "Where did you sleep last night?" He replied, "Nowhere." Then he said to him, "Where were you last night?" to which he replied, "I was over in town." In answer to further questions he said that he arrived in town from Ipswich "between 9 and 10 yesterday morning." He also said that he came over here soon after dinner time. Witness then asked him how long he remained over here, and he said for a while, after which he went over to meet the half-past 5 train from Ipswich. Asked him then what time he came back, and he said, "I don't know; it was late; the shops and hotels were closed." Defendant did not know either what time he got home, and said later on that he slept on Nolan's veranda until he was awakened by the cold, after which he went for a walk round the cemetery, and had only just come back. Then asked him if he knew where Hampstead-street was, to which he replied,

"Yes, well." Defendant said that it was about a month ago since he was in the locality referred to, and denied that he was there on Saturday night. Witness then conveyed defendant to the watch-house, where he charged him with wilfully and unlawfully setting fire to a dwelling in Hampstead-street, Woolloongabba, on the morning of the 30th August. Defendant said, "What! Is it the place I was living in?" Witness said, "Yes." Defendant did not ask any questions. On the application of Sub-inspector Geraghty, a remand was granted till the 8th instant.

## ALLEGED ARSON IN SOUTH BRISBANE.

At the South Brisbane Police Court on Tuesday, before Messrs. W. Yaldwyn, P.M., and J. Austin, J.P., a middle-aged man named John Finn appeared in custody charged, on remand, with wilfully and unlawfully setting fire to a dwelling-house in Hampstead-street, Woolloongabba, on the morning of the 30th August. Mr. B. Papi appeared for defendant, and Sergeant Ryan prosecuted on behalf of the police. Constables Colman and Martin gave evidence as to finding marks of hob-nailed boots on the ground surrounding the house, and to taking plaster of paris casts of the impressions. One of these casts corresponded with the right boot of defendant. Emily Corrie, a married woman, living next door to the house lately occupied by defendant, and which he is charged with setting fire to, deposed to seeing a man enter the front gate of the property and try to wrench the gate off. He went away, returned, and subsequently went away again. She could not identify the man. During that night a fire occurred in the house next door to her residence. Evidence was also given by Mary Nolan and Mary Finn, and, on the application of the police, defendant was remanded till next Monday.

## Fire Brigade Prevents a Conflagration.

### Finn Charged With Firing the House.

#### Police Court Proceedings.

Last week John Finn was charged with wilfully and unlawfully setting fire to a dwelling house in Hempstead-street, Woolloongahba. The house is the property of Sub-inspector Burke. It would appear that on Saturday night, August 21, just one week after the bailiffs had been put in, Finn came down to Brisbane, as was usual with him at the end of each month, and, presumably, not finding his family at the house (in fact the place was still empty) he went to Mrs. Nolan's place, and, after seeing his family had some dinner, went away, and later on in the evening he returned and stayed at the house for about half-an-hour, leaving about 7 o'clock. About half-past

awakened by a noise, and found that the house next door was on fire. In reply to Mr. Papi this witness said that although the house had been empty for a week, the gates were not locked, but she had not seen anyone in the yard, and the Fire Brigade did not go there. A Mrs. Rasmussen, a widow, living on the other side of the house, gave evidence as to the fire, but she does not appear to have seen anyone about the place. The evidence of Constables Coman and Martin was to the effect that Coman arrested Finn early on the Sunday morning. About 3.30 a.m. on Sunday, August 30, in consequence of something he was told, Coman went to the house in Hempstead-street and found that a fire had recently taken place there. He examined the place and took possession of a piece of wire, a piece of burnt straw which looked as if it was a piece of hat material, and two pieces of burnt wood. Martin had previously visited the house about 2 a.m., when he found the place open, but no one about, and on going inside found the floors covered with water, and every appearance of a recently extinguished fire. He thought

in a corner by the brick chimney. Coman and Martin then went to Mrs. Nolan's house, where they saw Mary Finn, and subsequently they found Finn himself about 7.30 a.m. Coman asked him where he had stopped that night, and Finn replied, "Nowhere." In reply to further questions, Finn said he had come from Ipswich on the previous day, arriving in Brisbane about 10 o'clock in the morning, and about 3 o'clock in the afternoon had gone to Mrs. Nolan's, where he had dinner. He had stayed there some time, and had then gone to meet the 5.30 train from Ipswich. He did not know what time it was when he came back, but the shops and hotels were closed. He went to Nolan's verandah and went to sleep, and he woke up very cold. He then went for a walk round the cemetery, and told the constables he had not long been back. Coman took him into custody, and with Martin, about 9.30 a.m. went back to Mrs. Nolan's, where they saw Mary Finn, and obtained from her a pair of boots and an overcoat. They then went to the house in Hempstead-street, and Coman made an examination of the ground in the yard, where he discovered several

He took impressions of them in plaster of paris. On the Monday at the watchhouse Martin showed Finn the boots and overcoat, and he said they belonged to him. On Sep-

Finn was a little the worse for liquor at the time, and Mrs. Nolan and his eldest daughter upbraided him for coming home in that state. They then told him that he should look after his children more, and informed him of how the bailiffs had been put into the Hempstead-street house, and the furniture seized and taken away, and that his family had found food and shelter from Mrs. Nolan. Finn was naturally very much upset at the direful news, and commenced crying. His daughter then got him some dinner, and advised him to go and get a bed at some boarding-house. After having his meal, Finn went away, leaving at Mrs. Nolan's his clothes, which included a pair of boots and an overcoat. He returned between 6 and 7 o'clock the same evening, and after a few minutes' conversation left saying he was going to see if a piece of wire he had put across the garden in Hempstead-street was still there. He took with him his overcoat. Before leaving he asked his daughter to go with him to see a house at Stanley Bridge on the following morning. This was

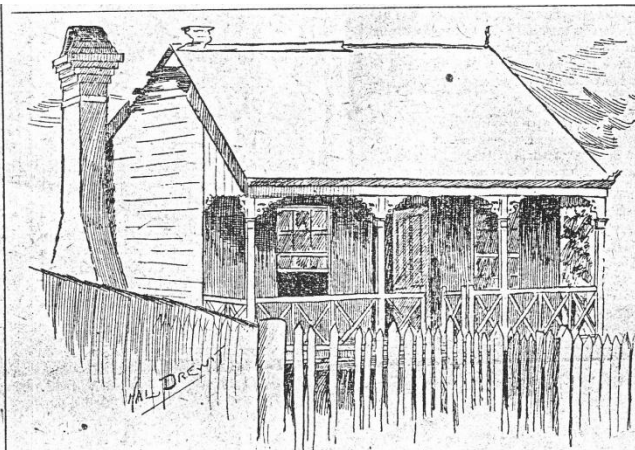

where he had been, he replied that he had been on the veranda for some time. Previous, however, to this, about a quarter past four o'clock, Mary Finn had been seen by Constables Coman and Martin. She told her father that they had been to the house looking for him, and he said he would go and see them and find out what they wanted. Before leaving he changed his boots. A Mrs. Emily Corrie said she lived next door to the house in which the Finn's had lived, and had known them for ten months. On August 29 she was on her veranda waiting for her husband to come home, when she saw a man coming from the direction of a paddock on the opposite side of the street. It was dark but she did not see the man's face, neither did she know him at all. All she could say was that he had an overcoat on and was wearing a dark hat. The man went into the gate of the empty house, and into the back, returning to the front he pulled up a few plants, which he threw into the road. He then

but did not succeed. Leaving the house, he re-crossed the road, but at once returned and opened the big gates, also trying to pull them off, but failed to do so. The man then went away. During the night she was

He was not there until after the fire, and could only say what he had heard. He did not see the fire. The daughter, Mary Finn, in giving her evidence, also stated that the family had been living in the house in Hempstead-street, which was the property of Sub-inspector Burke, for the previous 12 months, and that her father, who was working at Bundamba, only came home once a month. On August 22 the bailiffs had seized all the furniture in the house for rent. Her father was away at the time. He had not then been home for three weeks. This completed the evidence given on Tuesday, and Sergeant Ryan asked for a remand until to-morrow, September 14, as some of his witnesses were unable to be present until then. The bench granted the remand, and allowed bail in £80 and one surety of a similar amount.

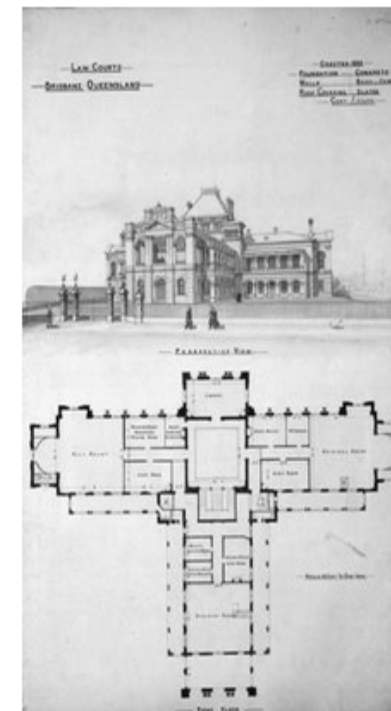

## Court records

### Brief guide 22

#### Supreme Court

Criminal and civil sittings of the New South Wales Supreme Court from 1850 to 1856. In 1857 a Resident Judge for Queensland was formerly established under the Supreme Court. Initially, the Supreme Court, Brisbane held jurisdiction was later to be divided into three districts. Registry

#### Court of Petty Sessions, 1844 - 1965

Courts of Petty Sessions (CPS) were in existence at the time of Separation from the Colony of New South Wales in 1859. The Court held original jurisdiction in minor criminal offences with right of appeal to the District Court. From 1867 the Court could sit as a Small Debts Court, whose functions are described below. The Court could sit as a Police Court and, during the twentieth century, was also the place where a number of other types of court hearings were held such as the Licensing Court, Children's Court, and Coroners Court.

The Clerk of the Court of Petty Sessions often acted as agent for State and Federal Government Departments on matters unrelated to the justice system. It is not unusual to find records received from a particular Clerk of the Court of Petty Sessions about non judicial matters.

CPS records at Queensland State Archives date from 1844 however, not all districts are represented. QSA holdings vary in quantity and content. Under the *Justices Act Amendment Act 1964* the courts known as Courts of Petty Sessions were renamed Magistrates Courts (see below).

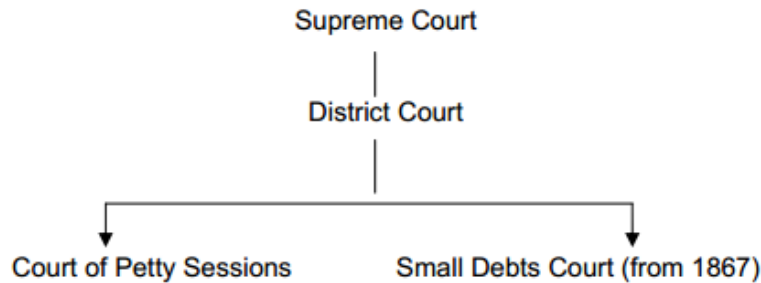

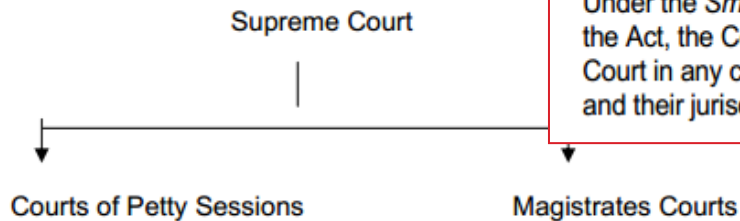

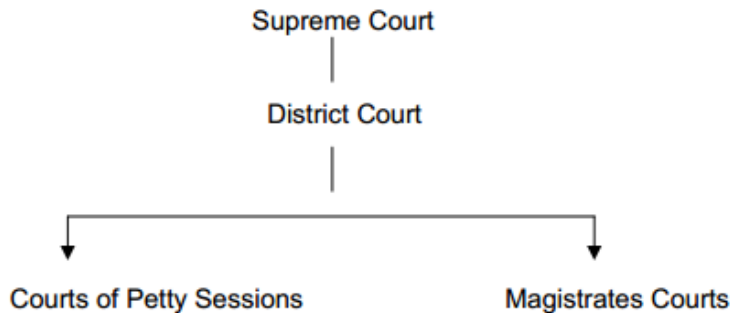
## Court Structure, 1858 - 1922

### Small Debts Court, 1867 - 1921

Under the *Small Debts Act 1867*, the Court of Petty Sessions could sit as a Small Debts Court. Under the Act, the Court held original civil jurisdiction for claims up to £50, with right of appeal to the District Court in any civil matter involving the sum of £10 or over. Small Debts Courts were abolished in 1922 and their jurisdiction passed to the newly formed Magistrates Court.

- **Children's Court** - set up in 1907 to deal with matters and offences about children under 17 years of age, e.g. applications for care and control, simple offences.
- **Industrial Magistrates Court** - set up in 1915 under the Queensland *Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act* to arbitrate in industrial matters. Appeals went to the Queensland Industrial Court. The Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Commission took over most of the arbitrator functions of the Industrial Court in 1961.
- **Coroners Court** - set up to inquire into certain types of death e.g. violent, sudden or unnatural death, death in prison or mental hospital and later, for disappearances. Inquests are also held in cases of fires and mining accidents.
- **Licensing Court** - set up in 1912 for the issuing of licenses including liquor, victuallers, billiards, bagatelle. In 1935 control of liquor licenses was assumed by the Licensing Commission. Further information on liquor licenses in [Brief Guide 14: Hotel Records](#).

Other judicial or quasi-judicial bodies include Fair Rents Court, Land Court, Local Government Court, Mining Wardens Court, Valuations Court





## Description

### ESTABLISHMENT:

Under the First and Second Charters of Justice (proclaimed in 1787 and 1814 respectively under the authority of Imperial Act 27 George III) justices of the peace appointed by the Governor were granted summary jurisdiction to hear petty criminal matters in the first instance without a jury.

The powers of justices of the peace and of police magistrates to sit as petty sessions were ultimately codified in the New South Wales Acts of 1835 (2 Victoria 2) and of 1850 (14 Victoria 43). This latter New South Wales Act ultimately formed the basis of the Queensland "Justices Act of 1886", which legislated for the appointment by the Governor in Council of districts for the holding of courts of petty sessions. The Court of Petty Sessions, Forsyth was proclaimed by the Governor in Council on 28 July 1911.

Under the "Justices Act Amendment Act 1964", from 1 January 1965 onwards: all courts of petty sessions districts were deemed to be magistrates courts districts, all places previously appointed for the holding of courts of petty sessions were deemed to be places for the holding of magistrates courts, all clerks of petty sessions were deemed to be registrars of magistrates courts.

### FUNCTIONS

Under a number of further Acts, the establishment of a place for the holding of a court of petty sessions was deemed to establish a number of further courts, for example, magistrates courts, fair rents courts, small debts courts. This agency definition will however be concerned purely with the court of petty sessions sitting as this court.

Courts of petty sessions had petty criminal jurisdiction and jurisdiction for summary actions of ejectment between lessors and lessees. Petty criminal jurisdiction is a complicated matter of law involving numerous Commonwealth and State statutes but can be briefly described as jurisdiction over summary trials of simple offences and committal proceedings for indictable offences sent to the Supreme Court.

In practice, if not in statute, courts of petty sessions were divided into three courts: police court (prosecutions commenced by police), summons court (prosecutions and proceedings for ejectment commenced by private prosecutors) and traffic court.

If you already know the date, or the approximate date, on which a petty sessions criminal case was heard you do not need to look at this index. Consult the series information for the Court of Petty Sessions/Magistrates' Court Registers, or, if the case involved an infringement of a Commonwealth Act or the defendant usually resided in another state, consult the series information for the Court of Petty Sessions/Magistrates' Court Commonwealth Register.

If you do not know the date on which a petty sessions criminal case was heard this index may help you if the person was convicted of the charge. The index does not include references to cases where the person was not convicted. Look for the surname of the person convicted under the appropriate alphabetical section. You may need to look through the whole alphabetical section to find the entry you are looking for. Make a note of the date of the conviction and, if given, the

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## The Police Gazette of Western Australia

The Police Gazette of Western Australia (1876 onwards) is a valuable resource for researching police and criminals in Western Australia.

Information can be found under various headings: apprehensions (name of person arrested, arresting constable, charge and sentence); police appointments, dismissals, discharges, promotions, resignations and transfers; tickets of leave, certificates of freedom, and conditional pardons issued to convicts; physical descriptions of prisoners (name, condition, build, age, height, hair and eye colour, visage, complexion, trade, nationality and distinguishing marks); deserters from military service; escaped prisoners; expirees leaving the colony; inquests (where held, date, before whom, name and date of death of person, verdict); licences (publican, gallon, eating, boarding and lodging houses, railway refreshment rooms, wine and beer, colonial wine, spirit merchants, club, wayside house, packet and billiard table - name of licensee, name of hotel etc and town or district given); missing friends; prisoners discharged; people tried at Quarter Sessions (name, offence, district, verdict, how disposed of); special inquiries; stealing in dwellings; and warrants issued.

With thanks to the Friends of Battye Library and the Sholl Bequest, the Police Gazettes 1876-1900 have been digitised and are fully text searchable.

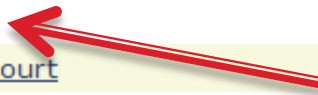

These records at Qld State Archives are useful for genealogy, especially if you are researching the **'black sheep' of the family** or someone who committed a very minor offence or was a **victim of crime**.

Police Station watchhouse charge books and Court of Petty Sessions police charge bench books often provide **clues to sources for further research** (Court, prison and mental asylum records, criminal depositions, murder files, Police Gazettes and other police records, etc.) Although the registers vary in format, most give **date, town, prisoner's name, aliases, age, occupation, religion, state or country of origin, education level, offence, and how disposed of** (fine or term of imprisonment, or whether sent to a reformatory, asylum etc. or discharged, cautioned, or committed for trial at which court and when). Some show **previous convictions** and **prisoner's signature and property**, and on rare occasions a **physical description**. Some **victims of crime** are named. There are occasional references to **illegitimate children** (I have seen one listing names, addresses and occupations of the child's mother, maternal grandparents and putative father).

**Offences** include theft, drunk and disorderly, breaking and entering, child (or wife) desertion, having no visible lawful means of support, attempted suicide, being of unsound mind, inciting to riot, beating a horse, assault, murder, supplying opium to an Aboriginal, and being a neglected child. **Children** appear in the records as both offenders and victims.

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**Pre-1900 watchhouse records are known to exist for these towns** (there may be others). Links open in a new window.

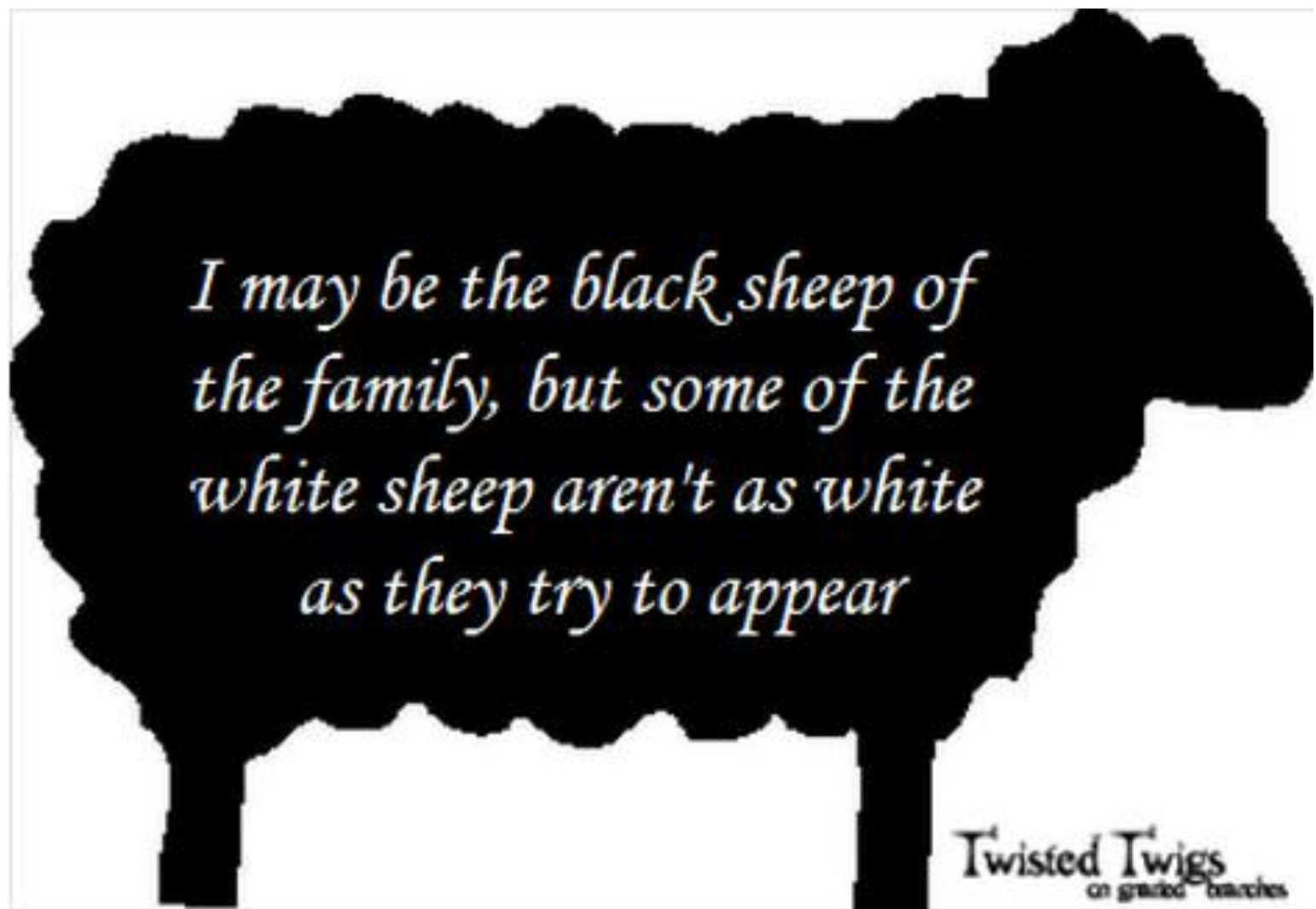
