Kew Historical Society / January 30, 2014

Many of the sporting clubs of Kew have a long and illustrious history. In 2014, the Kew Cricket Club is celebrating its 150th anniversary. In March 2014, during the Kew Festival, the Kew Historical Society will be mounting an exhibition on 'Sport in Kew' to which a number of sporting groups have been invited to participate.

Research on Sport in Kew to date includes:

Cycling

F.G.A Barnard wrote in 1910 that 'Several cycling clubs have been born and died, suffering chiefly from the migration of the leading spirits in the organisations, but since 1900 the Kew Flyer Road Race, instituted by Mr. H. F. Cooper, has been the cycling event of the year among local riders'. Perhaps, due to the importance of the Race, cycling flourished in Kew. In 1909, the Kew Social and Cycling Club was formed. Its colours were green and gold. It was to hold its first 10-mile race from the Harp of Erin Hotel in May.


FASCINATING FIND

A day at the races: the horse in Australia

The first horses arrived in Australia in January 1788. Along with the First Fleet's convict cargo, a stallion, four mares, a colt and a filly were landed at Port Jackson. By 1810, there were 203 horses in New South Wales, and the horse population rose dramatically throughout the 19th century - at its peak, there was approximately one horse for every two people in Australia.

Some of the people in the stories are elite athletes who became sporting heroines and household names, but many of the stories are about women whose achievements have been hitherto overlooked. Bringing these lesser known stories to light became our research priority.

Short historical notes, entered into a searchable database linked to this exhibition, have been prepared for over 100 women, teams and organisations. Some contain links to further bibliographical and archival resources. Longer essays have been prepared about a selection of women and organisations.



Administrative/Biographical history: Harry Sunderland was involved in sport as a competitor and administrator all his life. His early involvement was in Queensland becoming a Life Member of the Amateur Boxing and Wrestling Union, Brisbane Football League and the Brisbane Cricket Association before later moving south. He was also identified with the newspaper world from his early boyhood. He competed as a swimmer in the Australasian Championship meeting in 1909. His sporting involvement as an organiser covered cricket, boxing, wrestling, football, amateur athletics. He managed a record three Kangaroo tours, introduced the code into France and staged exhibition matches in California.

He was a master of publicity and persuaded the then Prince of Wales (later King Edward VIII) to meet the 1930 Kangaroos before their match. He was a special correspondent of the Sydney 'Sun' and accompanied the Australasian Rugby football team on world tours and later worked as the Circulation Manager for "The Sun News-Pictorial". Sunderland moved to England and became the first manager of the famous Wigan Club, before working as a BBC commentator. His legacy lives on in the Harry Sunderland Medal awarded to the Man of the Series in Anglo-Australian Tests.



Sport is important part of the culture in Australia, with a long history in the country dating back to the pre-colonial period. Attendance for the AFL, NRL & A-League over the course of a single season tops six million spectators.

The media plays an important part in Australia's sporting landscape. Many sporting events are televised or are covered by the radio. The government has **anti-siphoning laws** to protect free-to-air stations. Beyond televising live events, there are many sport television shows, sport talk shows on the radio, magazines dedicated to sport and extensive newspaper coverage. Australian sport has also been the subject of Australian made films such as *The Club*, *Australian Rules*, *The Final Winter* and *Footy Legends*.

As a nation, Australia has competed in many international events including the **Olympics** and **Paralympics**, and the **Commonwealth Games**. The country has a large number of national teams in sports such as cricket, rugby union, rugby league, basketball, hockey, netball, soccer, softball, water polo and wheelchair rugby. Sport is played by many different populations in Australia including men and women, people with disabilities and Australia's indigenous people.

Australia has sent athletes to almost all editions of the modern **Olympic Games**. Australia has competed in every [Summer Olympic Games](#), and every [Winter Olympic Games](#) except for the 1948 edition. The [Australian Olympic Committee](#) was founded and recognised in 1895. [Edwin Flack](#) was the first athlete to represent Australia at the Olympics. He won gold in both the 800 metres and the 1500 metres, competed in the [marathon](#) and won a bronze medal in tennis doubles at the 1896 [Summer Olympics in Athens, Greece](#). In 1908 and 1912 Australia competed with [New Zealand](#) under the name [Australasia](#). Australia's kit is green and gold.^{[1][2][3]}

Australia has hosted the Summer Olympic games twice. In 1956 in [Melbourne](#) and in 2000 in [Sydney](#) Australia finished 3rd and 4th in the respective medal counts. In the Summer Olympics since 2000, Australia has placed 4th, 4th, 6th and 10th respectively. Given Australia has a population of only around 20 million people (ranked 53rd in the world^[4]) this fact is frequently cited as noteworthy by the mainstream Australia media due to a strong sporting culture.^[5] Other observers have suggested this may also be a result of the generous funding the Australian Government has invested into elite sports development with the specific intention of improving performance at the Olympic games.^{[6][7]} Prior to Montreal, there was no government funding, however.

Many of Australia's gold medals have come in swimming, a sport which is popular in Australia, with swimmers from [Dawn Fraser](#) to [Ian Thorpe](#) ranking amongst the sport's all-time greats. Other sports where Australia has historically been strong include:

- [field hockey](#), with the women's team winning three gold medals between 1988 to 2000 and the men's team winning in 2004;
- [cycling](#), particularly track cycling;
- [rowing](#);
- [equestrian events](#) and specifically the three-day teams eventing;

William 'Billy' Pyers

(1933 - 2004)

Billy Pyers was a noted hands and heels rider and a superb judge of pace. His skills, combined with his effervescent personality, made him a favourite with the racing public.

Pyers had a remarkable start to his career – by the time he turned 24 in 1957, he had won the Adelaide jockeys' premiership seven times. He won his 8th and 9th premierships in 1959-60 and 1960-61. For the next few seasons he rode extensively at interstate carnivals where his feature wins included the Caulfield Cup, Moonee Valley Cup, Newmarket Handicap, Oakleigh Plate, Futurity Stakes, and Golden Slipper Stakes. On seven occasions he won the South Australian Oaks. In Tulloch's only appearance in Adelaide he rode that horse to victory in the SJ Pullman Select Stakes.

In 1964 Pyers accepted an offer to ride in France for trainer Ernie Fellows, and on his first ride in England won the classic Two Thousand Guineas at Newmarket. He later rode as No. 1 jockey for leading French owner Daniel Wildenstein, the Aga Khan and American Nelson Bunker Hunt.

His major successes included the King George VI and Queen Elizabeth Stakes (twice), French Derby, Irish Oaks, Ascot Gold Cup, Doncaster Gold Cup, and the 1967 Prix de l'Arc





