RBDM's World War One records

Story by Adrian Harrison

Few people realise that RBDM holds comprehensive death registrations for a large number of service men and women[1] who enlisted in Queensland and who died while on active duty during both world wars. Only the registries in South Australia and Tasmania took the trouble to compile similar archives. In total RBDM holds close to 10,000 death registrations for World War One and a further 5,000 from World War Two.



[1] There are at least two nurses listed in the records as dying in the line of duty; Norma Mowbray from St George and Rosa O'Kane from Charters Towers.

The First World War registrations were compiled under the direction of George Porter, who became Registrar-General in October 1921. Porter was by all accounts a bit of a maverick who did not necessarily rely on legislation to back up his decisions, and he took it upon himself to register the deaths of all the men and women who had, in his words, 'given their lives for Queensland'.

Porter believed that the registration of the death, and so the ready availability of a death certificate, would provide bereaved families with some form of closure for their lost loved ones, who at best were buried on the other side of the world—the British Empire had a strict policy of not repatriating its war dead—and at worst, had no known grave at all. Copies of the completed death certificates would be made available to the relatives for two shillings.

Compiling and entering the records was a mammoth and complex task. The battalion in which a dead soldier was serving when they died was not necessarily an accurate reflection of where they had enlisted. Although at the outbreak of war battalions had been raised largely within individual states, as the war progressed and casualties grew, battalions were merged and re-organised and reinforcements were sent wherever they were needed.

Alien registration

Records on aliens (ie non-British residents of Australia) are held for the two periods of compulsory registration. Aliens were first registered in 1916 during World War I, under the War Precautions Regulations 1916–1920, and again from 1939, under provisions of the Aliens Registration Act 1939. These measures continued beyond the war with the Aliens Act 1947 until 1971. Registration forms were collected by Customs and Immigration officials or local police. During World War II enemy aliens were required to present their alien registration to the local police station each week.

Internment

The Brisbane office holds many records relating to Italians who were investigated and interned. During World War II, Italians living in Australia were considered 'enemy aliens', including those born in Australia of Italian parentage. Concerted efforts were made to restrict the movement of those considered to be a threat on the home front. Enemy aliens, naturalised and Australian-born persons of enemy alien descent, and Australians whose political activities or loyalty was called into question were interned in camps administered by the Australian Army. Italians suspected of involvement with secret societies such as the Black Hand (Mana Nera) were particularly targeted during police investigations. Members of the Black Hand were suspected of being involved in organised crime during the 1930s in north Queensland, and were often held responsible for cases of extortion, kidnapping and murder.

Enemy aliens transferred from overseas and prisoners of war captured in war zones were also held in Australian internment camps. The majority of Italian internees from Queensland were sent to camps in Barmera and Loveday in South Australia and to Cowra in New South Wales, predominately during the period 1940 to 1943. Most internees were away from home until the end of the war. For those on the land this meant leaving their farms to be maintained by their wives and children.



Soldier portraits

Nearly 27,000 Queensland soldiers had their portrait taken and published in *The Queenslander* newspaper. Each portrait represents part of a Queensland family's story of their First World War experience.

State Library of Queensland has digitised all of these portraits and is making them available online through One Search, the catalogue. Anyone can view, add a comment, and download for free a high resolution digital file of any of the portraits.

We are also working with the National Archives of Australia to match and connect the soldier portraits with their war service record on the Discovering Anzacs website. Not all soldiers can be matched, but where this is possible a link to their service record is also available in One Search.


There are now over 3,000 portraits available online and more are being added each week. We expect that all of the portraits will be available online by August 2015.

Why were the portraits taken?


In September 1914, Talma Studios set up a tent in the soldiers camp at Enoggera, Queensland. Talma Studios were there to take a photograph of each soldier in the camp. Such was the demand, Fegan Studios also set up a tent at Enoggera for the same purpose. Uniforms were provided for those who had not yet been fitted out, so that every man's portrait would appear in the official setting.


The soldier portraits were then published in Pictorial Supplement of *The Queenslander* newspaper, a weekly summary and literary edition of the Brisbane Courier (now the Courier Mail). Throughout the years 1914-1919 this




Welcome to Queensland Places

You can **SEARCH** this site using the yellow search box above or **BROWSE A-Z** or select **RANDOM PAGE**. You can move back and forward alphabetically through the A-Z headwords using the green arrows at the top of each article. Click on an image to enlarge. Slides will play as a slide show, and you can move through these and the photo galleries using the back and forward arrows on each image.

Because some places are clustered together under **BROWSE A-Z** we recommend using the **SEARCH** facility. This will search all instances of the place name in the database, as well as all images and captions. If you do not find the place you are after, you will need to check the spelling or refer to the inclusion criteria in **ABOUT**. You can also **SEARCH** the database by any keyword or name. Any errors are notifiable via the **CONTACT** option to the editors.

Clermont and Copperfield





Clermont, a former mining town, is 320 km west of Rockhampton and 100 km north of Emerald. It was apparently named after Clermont, France, a name possibly suggested by Oscar de Satgé, a pioneer pastoralist.

Until gold was discovered at Clermont in 1861 it was a remote part of the Peak Downs pastoral district, which was settled by Europeans in 1854. The early gold finds were alluvial deposits, easily won by independent miners. The finds were near a seasonal lagoon – 'Hoods Lagoon' (quite soon 'Diggers Lagoon') – and a rudimentary hotel was built in 1862. The following year the settlement was proclaimed as the town of Clermont. Population levels ebbed and flowed with gold finds elsewhere and the availability of water, but there was a sufficiently

My indexes to original records at Queensland State Archives

- Mental asylum records. Look here for people who 'vanished', patients with depression, head injury, epilepsy, alcoholism etc, and details of their relatives. Indexes to various series (eg, Public Curator insanity files; Supreme Court insanity files; Colonial Secretary's in-letters; Annual Reports; casebooks). Other series of asylum records will also be indexed soon.
- Hospital admission registers. Often more accurate and more useful than certificates. Sometimes the only surviving source of immigration details. Lots of biographical data for local, interstate and overseas folk.
- Old age pension records. Includes applicants who were rejected (under age or other reasons), and many people not on electoral rolls.
- <u>Illegitimate children</u> whose father is named in an archival source (but not the birth certificate).
- <u>Police Gazettes</u>. Friends and relatives sought, missing persons, alleged offenders, prisoners, wife/child/ship deserters, victims of crime, etc. Many *Police Gazette* notices include a detailed physical description or a photograph.
- Police station watchhouse records. People arrested and victims of crime (including 'neglected children').
- Prison records. Many give ship of arrival, physical description etc.
- Maintenance payments to deserted wives, children, illegitimate children.
- Undertakings re fares. Premier's Department files re travel by rail or ship (mainly interstate but some international).
- . Women granted protection orders, 1888-1904.
- Dentists and dental apprentices. Includes women.
- · Nurses and masseurs (male & female).
- Cooktown residents who signed a petition in 1874. The original document has their signatures.
- . Cooktown Boys' School admission register.
- 'Interim Index'. Selected names from many sources (Court records, Police correspondence, Grammar School records, etc.)

Renamed Places in Queensland

Anyone doing local or family history knows the frustration of finding a town or street name or building name that just doesn't appear on a current map. This WWW page is intended to help find out the location and/or new name for those old/forgotten places in Queensland.

The list is sorted alphabetically by the old name or use the Find function in your browser (usually CTRL-F) if that's faster or you are looking for a new name.

The information provided here is on a "best efforts" basis. Please read the notes and sources and check the map link in order to satisfy yourself that this is the location you are looking for. Where possible, I try to include online access to sources and maps I refer to, but in some cases I cannot do so for reasons such as copyright.

Please send me any updates/corrections to kerry.raymond@gmail.com Even if you don't know the full story of the name change, many researchers would welcome any clue to track down those elusive places.

Also send old placenames even if you don't know the new place name. Please send as much information as you can about how you came upon the placename as that may contain vital clues. I can add them to the WWW page and someone out there may be able to provide the new name if I can't track it down.

Just a note on sources. I try to provide online sources wherever possible, but unfortunately some web pages move or disappear over time. Please let me know if you find a broken link. Often I can find the new online location or provide access to the old page via the Internet Archive. Unfortunately the Internet Archive usually only saves the text from old web pages and not the images, so if I must now point you at the Internet Archive, please expect that the page you will reach will probably look at bit messy but it's the best I can provide for you.

During the history of the Diocese, the churches below have been closed. A Parish Council may deem the closure of a church necessary for reasons such as:

- · the congregation may have decreased;
- · the land may have been resumed by a civil authority; or
- · the building may no longer meet the needs of the Parish.

The Parish Council, having made a decision on closure, must hold a public meeting followed by a meeting of parishioners at which the decision is considered. Application is then made to the Archbishop for the closure of the Church and the removal of its dedication. If the closure is approved by the Church authorities, a closing service is usually held in the Church. At this service, the Petition is presented, the Deed of Closure is read and the dedication of the building is formally removed.



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
