

Between 1788 and 1868, approximately 162,000 convicts were transported to the various Australian penal colonies by the British government.^[1]

The British government began transporting criminals to overseas colonies in the 16th century. When transportation to the American colonies declined with the move towards American independence in the 1770s, an alternative site was needed to avoid further overcrowding of British prisons and hulks. In 1770, James Cook charted and claimed possession of the east coast of Australia for Britain. Due to the continent's isolation, it was considered ideal for a penal colony, and in 1787 the First Fleet of eleven convict ships set sail for Botany Bay, arriving on 20 January 1788 to found Sydney, the first European settlement in Australia. Other penal colonies were later established in Van Diemen's Land (Tasmania), Queensland and Western Australia. Penal transportation to Australia peaked in the 1830s and dropped off significantly in the following decade. The last convict ship arrived in Western Australia on 10 January 1868.

Many of the convicts were transported for petty crimes; others were political prisoners. More serious crimes, such as rape and murder, were not transportable offences. After their prison terms were served most stayed in Australia and joined the other settlers, with some rising to prominent positions in Australian society. Approximately 20% of modern Australians are descended from transported convicts. Once deemed the "convict stain", it is now considered by many Australians to be a cause for celebration to have a convict in one's lineage. The extent to which the convict era has shaped Australia's national character has been studied by many writers and historians.^[2]







CONVICT RECORDS

The Swan River Settlement had been in existence for twenty years when it took the unusual step of electing to become a British penal settlement in 1849. Eager Home authorities accepted the offer and quickly dispatched the barque Scindian, which arrived in Gage Roads on the 1st June 1850 with a cargo of 75 male convicts aboard. This was to be the first of 43 shipments of convicts to the colony over an 18 year period.

Although a total of 9,925 convicts were officially transported during this period, it is estimated that some 500 of these were local prisoners intermixed with the transported convicts.



Courts and Criminal Justice – Convict Records

Convicts as referred to in this PROV*guide* are those people convicted of an offence in Britain, or a British colony, whose sentence was to be transported to New South Wales, Tasmania or Western Australia. Transportation officially ceased in New South Wales and Tasmania in 1853 and in Western Australia in 1868. Strictly speaking, no convicts were transported directly to the Port Phillip District of New South Wales. However convicts did find their way to the District, and this generally happened in one of three ways: a convict from Sydney could be assigned to a work gang in Port Phillip; a ticket of leave holder might enter Port Phillip from either New South Wales or Tasmania to work and was required to register with the authorities; or the convict may have been an Exile.



In inquest was holden on Thursday last, at the Black Dog, Cambridge-street, on the body of an old man named Richard Walker. It appeared in evidence, that on the morning of Thursday last the deceased had called at his daughter's house on the Rocks, and that he had gone into the back-yard, and remained there such an unusual time, that his daughter was induced to go and seek him. She found the old man extended in the yard in a fit. She called her husband and some of the neighbours and removed him into the house and put him to bed. The son-inlaw immediately repaired to Dr. Hosking, and after stating the nature of the fits, requested him to give his attendance. The Doctor enquired who was to pay him ? The son-in-law pleaded poverty, and declined becoming security for any sum, however small, though a good shoemaker. Accordingly the Doctor finding that the charity was to be all on his side, did not go. The old man lingered in the fits until three o'clock in the afternoon, and then he expired. The Jury returned a verdict-" That the decased had died by the visitat on of God."

To the Editor of the Sydney Gazette.

SIR,—I cannot allow the aspersion thrown out against my professional character in your report of the Coroner's inquest held on the body of *Richard Walker*, which appeared in your last *Gazette*, to pass without notice—especially as I consider no Coroner's Jury have a right to call in question the motives of any medical man for not doing what they may consider to be his duty.

In the first place, I have to state, that although the applicant had no pecuniary means of remunerating me, as stated at the inquest, had it been otherwise, I could not have gone at that time to visit the person, having but a few moments returned from a patient whom I could not have left for any length of time. Finding I was engaged, why could not the messenger have sought other medical assistance { and, moreover, it would have been useless had I gone, as I have heard since that the man was dead before he returned home.



St Helena Convict Indexes 1863-1936

These indexes record the names of all convicts (prisoners) who were held at St Helena Penal Establishment. The records were created in part by the Police Department, Water Police 1863-1867 and, H M Penal Establishment, St Helena 1867-1886, and the Brisbane Correctional Centre 1917-1923.

Each series has been individually indexed under its series title.

Background

1. <u>Series ID 7299 General record and description of prisoners admitted to St</u> <u>Helena, 1917-1923</u>

The following details are recorded in the register (<u>Item ID 271421; A/18565</u>):- prisoner number, name of prisoner and alias if used, papers, date of receipt in prison, offence, date of sentence, sentence, special remission, date of discharge by remission, date when discharged, by whom sentenced, remanded or committed for trial, previous convictions, trade or calling, date of birth, height, colour of hair and eyes, remarks.

This register appears to have been written at H.M. Prison, Brisbane, and may have been a central record for the disposal of prisoners throughout Queensland. This particular section refers to those admitted to St. Helena. Although the register generally records those prisoners admitted from 1917 onwards, prisoners who were already at St. Helena in 1917 are also recorded, together with their date of admission.

2. <u>Series ID 7300 Register of Male Prisoners Admitted to St Helena (with descriptions)</u> - <u>Sentences 12 months and upwards</u>, 1919-1924

This register (<u>Item ID 271422; A/18565</u>) records details of male prisoners serving sentences of twelve months and upwards at HM Penal Establishment, St Helena, kept by HM Prison, Brisbane (Boggo Road).

The following information is recorded : number, name, prison, date of receipt in prison, offence, date of sentence, sentence, special remission, date of discharge by remission, date when discharged, where sentenced, remanded or committed for trial, previous convictions, trade or calling, age, height, colour of hair and eyes, papers and remarks.

Courts and Criminal Justice – Prison Records

The administration of gaols and penal institutions in the nineteenth century

Prior to 1871 penal institutions and gaols were separately administered by officers located within the Chief Secretary's Department (VA 475). In 1871 under the provisions of the *Statute of Gaols Amendment Act* 1871, the Inspector-General of Penal Establishments assumed responsibility for the administration of gaols, and a Penal and Gaols Branch (VA 1464) was established within the Chief Secretary's Department. The branch was responsible for the management of Victorian gaols and penal institutions and the control and supervision of the adults and minors who were detained.

The earliest penal institutions were almost entirely punitive in emphasis, while gaols were used for the detention of prisoners not sentenced to hard labour, such as debtors, lunatics, the old, the destitute and children who had been convicted of vagrancy. Records relating to gaols and penal institutions: a select list

Victorian prisons were required to submit information about the prisoners in their custody to the Penal and Gaols Branch (VA 1464) of the Chief Secretary's Department. There was no state-wide centralised registration of prisoners until 1985. In the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries it was common practice for a prisoner to be moved directly from the court where the trial was held to a local prison, such as Beechworth. If the trial took place outside the Melbourne area researchers are advised to consult the records of local prisons. For records of individual institutions see <u>VRG 9 Prisons and Youth Training Centres</u> on PROV's online catalogue.

From around 1860 Pentridge became the central prison for the Melbourne area, and registers were kept for both male and female prisoners who passed through Pentridge. These prisoners were registered in <u>VPRS 515 Central</u> <u>Register of Male Prisoners</u> [1850 – 1948] and <u>VPRS 516 Central Register of Female Prisoners</u> [1857 – 1948]. Please note that these registers only contain details of prisoners that passed through Pentridge and were not state-wide central registers. Unless a prisoner passed through Pentridge it is unlikely that there will be a reference to them in VPRS 515 and VPRS 516.



Brief Guide 39

This Brief Guide provides an overview of Queensland State Archives records relating to mental health patients. Prior to the separation from New South Wales in 1859, there were no facilities for psychiatric treatment in the Moreton Bay Region. As such, mentally disturbed persons, or "lunatics", would have been sent to Brisbane Gaol or possibly to an asylum in Sydney. Woogaroo Lunatic Asylum opened in 1865 with 69 patients, and has undergone many name changes and renovations since.

There are two main types of mental asylum records held at Queensland State Archives: Public Curator Insanity files and Goodna Case Books.

Public Curator insanity files

In general Public Curator insanity files held at Queensland State Archives consist of records of people who were admitted to the institutions in Goodna (Woogaroo), Ipswich (Sandy Gallop), or Toowoomba (Willowburn).

Royal Derwent Hospital 1827-2000

The Hospital was created to provide in-patient treatment and rehabilitation of mentally ill and mentally handicapped persons, including treatment of alcoholics.

It has been known by various names throughout its history. In 1968 the Lachlan Park Hospital, as it was then called, was merged with the Millbrook Rise Psychopathic Hospital to form the Royal Derwent Hospital, the name it would retain until its closure in 2000.

What is online?

Admission papers, 1843-1964 (HSD285) Not all admissions have been scanned. It is better to conduct an item search on the

patient's name (in the form Citizen, John). This will display other records that are available, such as the patient file. The admission papers can still be viewed online using this method.

- New Norfolk Invalid and Mental Asylum: Patient admission register, 1830 1930 by Dianne Cassidy. This work is based on the admission registers (HSD247 above) and is easier to use than the original source
- Register of death, transfer or discharge of patients, 1830-1966 (HSD254) Chronological. Note: There are access restrictions. Please contact us for more information.
- Alphabetical register of patients, 1888-1974 (HSD252)
- Patient files of the Millbrook Rise Psychopathic Hospital, 1934-1968 (AB372) Millbrook Rise merged with Lachlan Park Hospital in 1968 to form the Royal Derwent Hospital. These files contain only administrative correspondence. Clinical data is on the Case Book sheets, AB479 (see below)


