What Are Brick Walls?

- ▶ Where you simply cannot go back any further
- ▶ Information just not there – blank fields on certificates
- ▶ Missing information, missing records
- ▶ Someone disappears
- ▶ Someone just appears
- ▶ Too many suspects (common names)
- ▶ Anything that stops you progressing



First Questions

- ▶ Did you build the brick wall yourself?
- ▶ Are you following the golden rules of genealogy?
- ▶ Are you just using indexes & transcripts?
- ▶ Need to look at certificates & original documents
- ▶ People make mistakes!



Golden Rules No 1 & No 2

- ▶ Always work backwards from the known (yourself) to the unknown (forebears)
- ▶ Do you really know your parents, grandparents, other relatives?
- ▶ Are there any surprises out there?
- ▶ Never believe everything on a birth, death or marriage certificate
- ▶ Information is only as good as informant's knowledge
- ▶ Birth & Marriage certificates perhaps more reliable than Death certificates – but not always!

Golden Rules No 3 & No 4

- ▶ Never completely trust the spelling of surnames, place names etc
- ▶ Always check given name and surname variants when researching
- ▶ Possibly the most common reason why ancestors cannot be found



Name Variations

- ▶ Both given names and surnames
- ▶ Abbreviations – Wm, Thos, Margt etc etc
- ▶ Nicknames – my Pearl turned out to be Maria!
- ▶ Aliases and de facto relationships
- ▶ Maiden names for children's birth entries

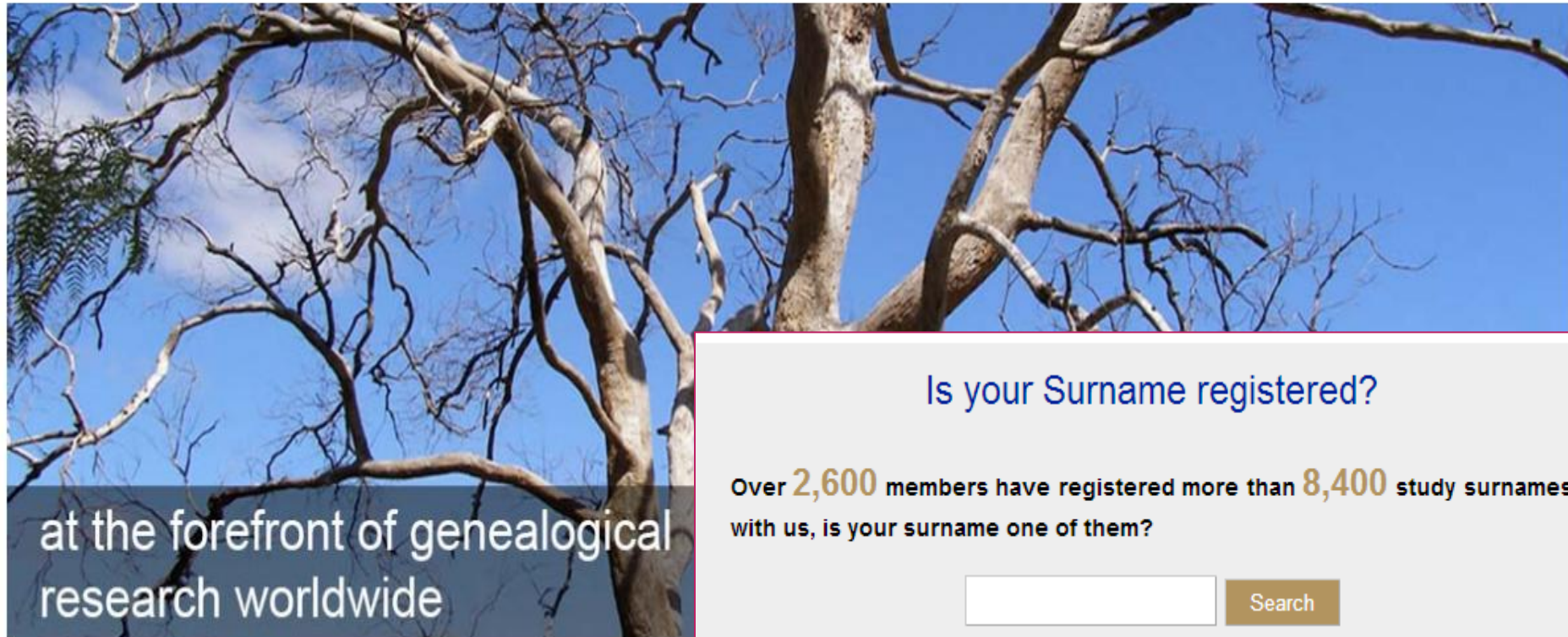

Variants: This study is registered for the variants Peplar, Peplow, Peploe, Peppler and Peplo. I also consider Pepelowe, Pepplow, Peplor, Peplowe, and anything that has 2 P's separated by a vowel and followed by an L. I do rule out those names that end in 'ski' and Peplaus are on the fence. Because there is such a variation even in the life events of a single individual, I have a tendency to refer to the name as Peplx. I am always surprised by the suffix .

Distribution: Peplx are everywhere but usually in small numbers. There appear to be both Peplows and Peplers from the beginning of surnames in both the British Isles and Germanic regions. Groups migrated from both countries to the Americas and Australia. One Germanic Pepler wandered down to South Africa very early and nearly all of that name there can be traced back to him. The large question unanswered is if there is a connection between the British and Germanic families. The earliest Peplers in Britain are around Wiltshire and London, the earliest Peplo??s around Shropshire and London. In Germany, Peplo??s are in Pommern near Ruegan and Pepplers are more in the Baden area.

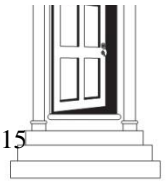

Anglicised & Foreign Names

- ▶ Both given names and surnames
- ▶ Non English speaking cultures – Europe, China etc
- ▶ Chinese look under A for Ah – but also check under the other initial – not consistent
- ▶ My Norwegian Aose died as Mary and Andreas as Andrew



Spelling Variations

- ▶ People were illiterate, difficulties with accents (Union turned out to be Onion)
- ▶ Indexing errors
 - Poor handwriting
 - Old styles of writing
 - Judy Webster – *Using and Compiling Indexes*
- ▶ Remember to use wildcards

Traps involved in using indexes

These **rules for using indexes** have been selected from a list reported to be from the 'Genealogy Week' section of *Antique Week* and attributed to James L. Hansen of the State Hist. Soc. of WI, USA.

- An index is only an index. It is not a substitute for the record being indexed.
- It doesn't matter how you spell the name, it only matters how the indexer spelled it.
- In a given record, any vowel may at any point be substituted for any other vowel or consonant.
- If you haven't found it in the index, you can only conclude that you haven't found it in the index. You cannot conclude that it's not in the record.
- Sometimes it is best to ignore the index altogether.

Spelling Didn't Matter To Our Ancestors — Wild Cards to the Rescue

Our ancestors often used a variety of spellings for their first names and surnames. You can use wildcards with the Exact filter selected to find unusual spellings of names.

There are two wildcard characters:

- ? (question mark) : matches one character which can be anything
- * (asterisk) : matches 0 to N characters

So if you enter Sm?th* you can match Smith, Smyth, Smithe and Smythe

Ann* will match Ann, Anne, Anna, and Annabelle

My maiden name is Gillespie, and it is very often spelled: Gillaspie, Gillispie or Gillespie or even Gillespy.

I can use wildcards to match a variety of combinations.

Golden Rule Nos 5 & 6

- ▶ Always have at least two separate sources of proof for each event
- ▶ Don't blindly trust other people's research – always check it yourself
- ▶ Remember that everything is only speculation until verified



Citing Your Sources

- ▶ Record in detail where you find information – original records, published information & websites
- ▶ Cite it clearly so that you and others can also find it, either now or in the future
- ▶ You will not remember where in a few years/decades time



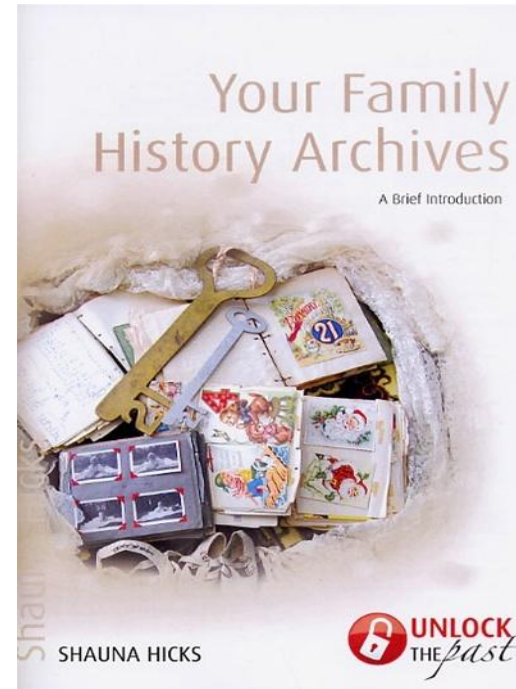
Golden Rule No 7 & No 8

- ▶ Always photocopy or digitise certificates and important documents and leave the originals in a safe place – multiple copies means greater safety for your research. Backup, backup, backup!
- ▶ If a document exists, read it!
- ▶ So obvious, yet people miss vital clues eg informants, witnesses, addresses, significance of dates etc
- ▶ Re read later as it may mean more when you know more



Backup Your Family History

- ▶ Paper
- ▶ Photographs
- ▶ Memorabilia
- ▶ Digital



Golden Rule No 9

- ▶ Join at least one family history group, genealogical society or historical society
- ▶ Either near where you live or where your ancestors lived
- ▶ Why – many benefits of membership



Membership of Societies

► Many benefits

- Members only services
- Access to a library/ subscription databases
- Knowledgeable volunteers/ members
- Regular meetings, guest speakers
- Seminars, workshops, conferences
- Newsletter/journal
- Website



Golden Rule No10

- ▶ Share your information and documentation (copies only) with other researchers
- ▶ Ensures your research is not lost or forgotten
- ▶ Who inherits your family history research?



Common Search Mistakes

- ▶ Start with yourself and work back, step by step, certificate by certificate
- ▶ Otherwise you may end up tracing the wrong person
- ▶ My great grandmother was Elizabeth Judge, she married under that name but it was not the name she was born with!

Someone Disappears

- ▶ Skeletons in the family
- ▶ Everyone has them
- ▶ Places to look
 - Court of Petty Session records
 - Gaols and prisons
 - Asylums and hospitals
 - Insolvency and bankruptcy
 - Inquests (suicides, murders)



Someone Appears

- ▶ Probably skeletons again
- ▶ Hiding a convict background
- ▶ Hiding an illegitimate birth
- ▶ Fostering or adoption
- ▶ Deserted a wife and family someplace else



Serendipity

- ▶ According to the Oxford Dictionary, the definition of serendipity is ‘the occurrence and development of events by chance in a happy and beneficial way’
- ▶ In other words, a fluke, luck
- ▶ Search every index/database – you just never know

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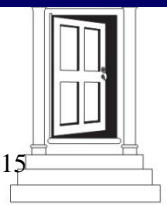

With four gg grandparents born in Ireland it is no wonder that I am interested in Irish heritage and culture. Of the four it is only my gg grandmother Maria Jeffers who gives me any real insight into her life back in Ireland. However, I will also outline the other Irish gg grandparents just in case someone else is interested in those families.

Maria Jeffers arrived in Brisbane in 1864. Maria (daughter of Isaac Jeffers and Harriet Ballantyne) was born in Portadown, County Armagh in 1844. Maria came to Queensland, Australia on board the *Legion of Honour* in 1864. She married Adam Johnston (see below) in 1864 in Brisbane, Queensland. In later life she had a close friend Abraham Francis and she is seen with him in this photograph.

Of my four Irish ancestors, Maria Jeffers is the only one known to have kept contact with her family back in Ireland. A few surviving letters to and from one of her brothers who stayed in Portadown confirms this. The letters were in poor condition with pages and pieces missing and had been given to one of Maria's

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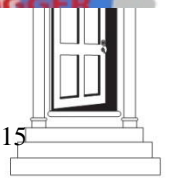

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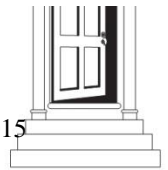
