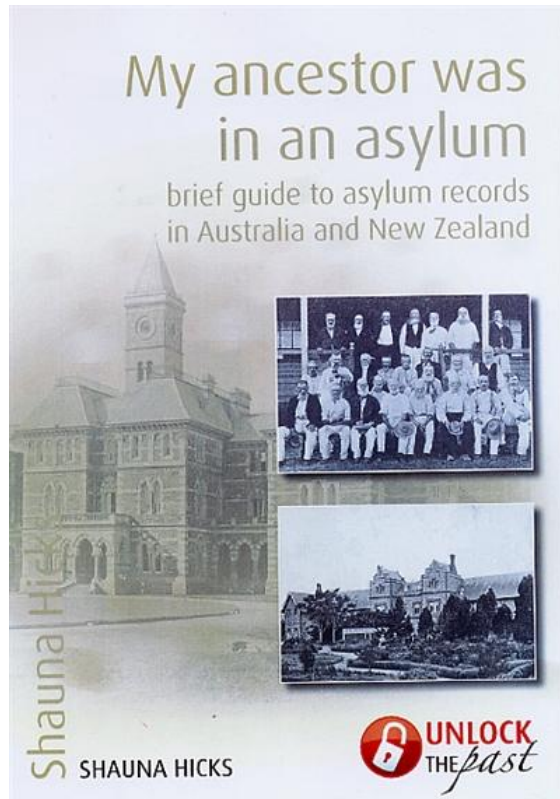

- Terms include benevolent, mental, psychiatric hospitals, sanatoriums etc
- For the sick, not just those with mental illness
- For the aged
- For the destitute
- For the forgotten
- For those with no one else to care for them

- Lots of resources especially in State Archives Asylums, Colonial (Chief) Secretary's Office, Hospitals, Justice Department (inquests), Police Department, Prisons Department (gaols)
- Trove (photographs, newspapers, published histories etc)
- Police gazettes



Types of Records

- Admission files
- Admission registers (registers of patients)
- Case books (case files)
- Indexes and alphabetical lists
- Medical case books
- Warder's diaries
- Access varies around Australia

Brief Guide 39

This Brief Guide provides an overview of Queensland State Archives records relating to mental health patients. Prior to the separation from New South Wales in 1859, there were no facilities for psychiatric treatment in the Moreton Bay Region. As such, mentally disturbed persons, or “lunatics”, would have been sent to Brisbane Gaol or possibly to an asylum in Sydney. Woogaroo Lunatic Asylum opened in 1865 with 69 patients, and has undergone many name changes and renovations since.

There are two main types of mental asylum records held at Queensland State Archives: Public Curator Insanity files and Goodna Case Books.

Public Curator insanity files

In general Public Curator insanity files held at Queensland State Archives consist of records of people who were admitted to the institutions in Goodna (Woogaroo), Ipswich (Sandy Gallop), or Toowoomba (Willowburn).

Does your family history have someone who **'vanished'**? If you **cannot find a death certificate** or if **children were raised** by someone other than a parent, check **mental asylum** records. Reasons for admission included **epilepsy, head injury, alcoholism, birth defects** and **depression** (especially post-natal depression). Many patients (adults and children) spent only a few days in an asylum, and descendants would be unaware of that.

'Public Curator insanity files' (which are only closed for 75 years from the date of the last document in the file) are different from 'case books'. These insanity files are mainly about getting someone to pay for the patient's maintenance, so they often have superb information about the **patient's relatives**.

Qld State Archives hold Public Curator insanity files for people admitted to mental asylums at Goodna (Woogaroo / Wolston Park), Toowoomba (Willowburn) and Ipswich (Sandy Gallop). The size and contents of these files vary, but they usually give **dates** of admission and discharge or death, and many include **letters** from the patient or his/her relatives, and sometimes **police reports, certificates, wills, divorce details, lists of property**, etc. Information about **relatives** may include addresses, biographical data, children, employment history, property, financial and social circumstances, etc.

Qld State Archives have a printed **index to old insanity files c1865-1893**, and (arranged only by first letter of surname) a **register of insanity files up to 1918** and an **index to insanity files 1919-c1945**. Names below are from my index to the 'register up to 1918', which has some details for patients whose file is missing.

Brief administrative history

Function of government

One of the functions of Government, overtime, has been to provide care for the poor and infirm as part of social and community services. More detail on the history of the Government function of social and community services can be found in [Archives Investigator](#). By choosing the advanced search option you can search for function 4 — Social and community services.

Care for the poor and infirm is not the same as care provided as part of mental health programs. For records relating to mental health patients please see [Archives in Brief 85](#).

The Benevolent Society

Before 1862 care for the infirm and destitute was primarily provided by non-government organisations. The Benevolent Society, founded in 1813, opened the first asylum for the poor, blind, aged and infirm in 1821 on the site of Central Railway Station.

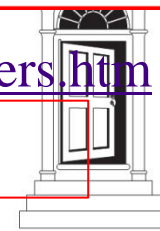

Shaw, Ann, aged 35, native of Ireland; arrived in 1860, in Merlin; died January 4, of pneumonia. Sullivan, Jane, aged 54, native of England; died January 3, of pneumonia.

Tansen, Christian, aged 26, native of Denmark; arrived in 1877 in Sarah Ann; died January 6, of phthisis. Thomas, Mary, aged 36, native of Ireland; arrived in 1855 in Queen of the Seas; died December 20, of pneumonia. Thorne, Marion, aged 34, native of Herefordshire; arrived in 1870 in Bombay; died December 30, of enteritis. Tierney, Mary, aged 38, native of Ireland; arrived in 1864 in Marco Polo; died December 20, of phthisis. Truby, Stephen, aged 58, native of London; arrived in 1853, in Jane Francis; died January 11, of dilatation of the heart.

Wainwright, William, aged 43, native of Gosport; arrived in 1856, in Mermaid; died January 3, of strangulated hernia.

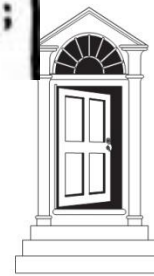

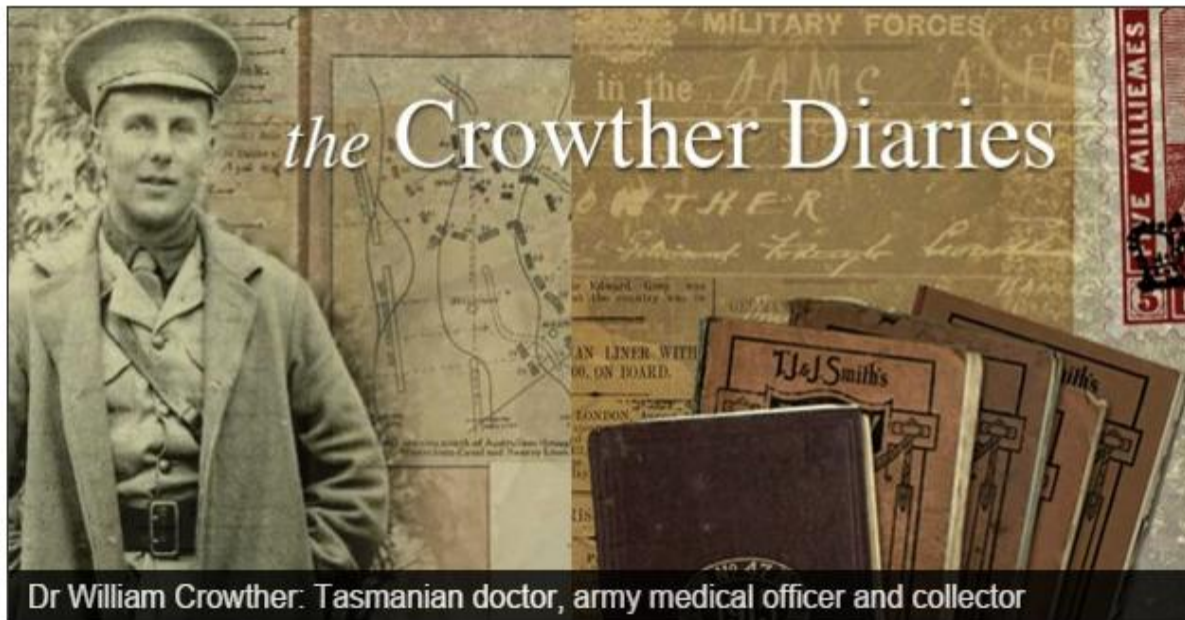

This is a description of some of the resources for Tasmanian genealogy I have found useful over the years. It is a personal selection and biased towards my own experiences and will no doubt omit some useful material and may contain some inaccuracies. For instance, I haven't used Tasmanian institutions outside of Hobart and it's likely that many of the resources noted to be at the Archives Office of Tasmania are also available in the north of the state and probably elsewhere. My thanks to Meryl Yost for suggestions and refinements and to the many people who have given me tips and help over the years.

What resources you use will depend on the problem you are trying to solve, but those ones I think are particularly useful under certain categories (especially for beginners) I've marked with **START HERE!** Although many on-line and CD resources are mentioned here, it is wise to remember to always check the primary source, as transcription and spelling errors are all too common.

Types of information available

Though not so good for the ancestor, for the family history researcher discovering that an ancestor was hospitalised is great, as hospital records can provide a lot of information. Early records of the Adelaide Hospital (later the Royal Adelaide Hospital) include many of the following details:

- name
- admission and discharge dates
- medical officer in attendance
- ailment
- address
- marital status
- occupation
- place of origin
- age
- length of residence in the colony
- name of ship arrived on
- rates charged for treatment
- occasionally there are even comments about the patient's background, treatment or death

The public health system included not only the sick but also the destitute and the mentally disabled. The early destitute and asylum records are full of interesting information, such as:

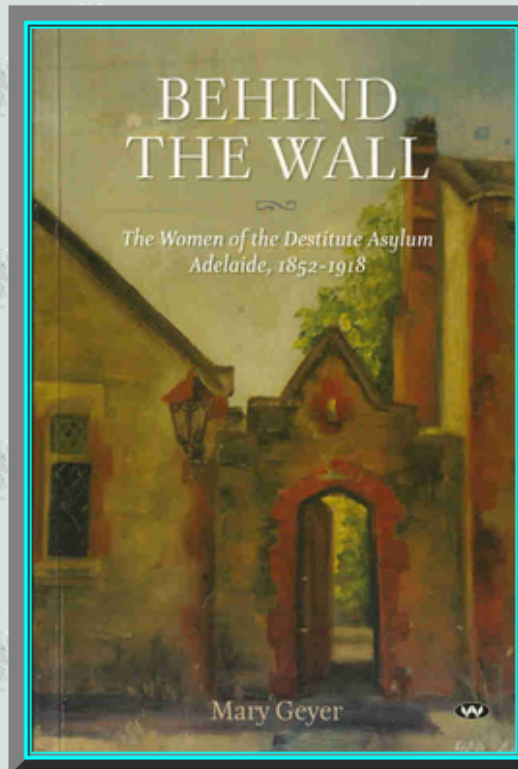

Behind The Wall
The Women of the Destitute Asylum
Adelaide, 1852-1918

Mary Geyer

Behind The Wall is a compelling social history, which provides an insight into Adelaide's Destitute Asylum and the women who experienced life behind its walls. Although out of sight, the men, women and children who were forced to use its facilities, were certainly not out of mind. Until its closure in 1917 politicians and governments, Commissions and Boards of Inquiry tried to solve the problem and cost of destitution to the colony.

South Australia was planned according to the Wakefield principles, where there would be no poor or destitute. According to this theory emigration of the correct proportion of capital and labour would create an ideal society free from social, economic, political or religious problems. It would be a self-sustaining society, prosperous and virtuous without the need to provide for paupers.

Within months of landing at Holdfast Bay harsh reality would prove to be very different. Almost from the very start the South Australian Immigration Agent had to provide assistance to those in need. As early as 1843 the government passed its first legislation to deal with poverty. It now became law that relatives were responsible for the maintenance and relief of deserted wives and children.

Six years later the South Australian government became the main source of relief funds and established the Destitute Board to administer the destitute. During 1849 the Board provided relief to 25 indoor and 114 outdoor destitute. By 1851 this had increased to 63 and 187 respectively. By 1855 it reached an all time high when it had to provide relief to more than 3,000 men women and children.

This alarmingly high number came about as a result of excess female immigration which resulted in lower wages being paid, a very poor harvest causing increased unemployment and the large number of wives who had been deserted by their husbands leaving for the Victorian goldfields. Deserting husbands were the chief cause of female poverty and it was suggested that these men should be flogged. During 1865 there were still 1,276 people on relief of which 150 were housed at the much overcrowded Destitute Asylum.

The State Records Office holds a large number of records created by the central agency responsible for health in Western Australia. These records were created by the Health Department and its predecessor agencies. The State Records Office also holds some records of mental health institutions, general hospitals and Local Boards of Health.

Clients who wish to view restricted health records must obtain written permission from the Health Department. Departmental Records

The Central Board of Health was established by the Public Health Act of 1886, as the governing authority for the Local Boards of Health. The functions of the Board included conducting health inspections of abattoirs, schools and factories as well as supervising and controlling the sanitary services of all Government buildings throughout the State.

Circa 1904 the Board began to be referred to as the Public Health Department.

Christmas Day 1906 Dunwich Benevolent Asylum

Summary: Dunwich was the site of the Moreton Bay Quarantine Station from the 1820s to the 1860s, and was converted into an asylum in 1866. The asylum continued at Dunwich until 1946, when it was moved to the vacant R.A.A.F. buildings at Eventide, Sandgate.
