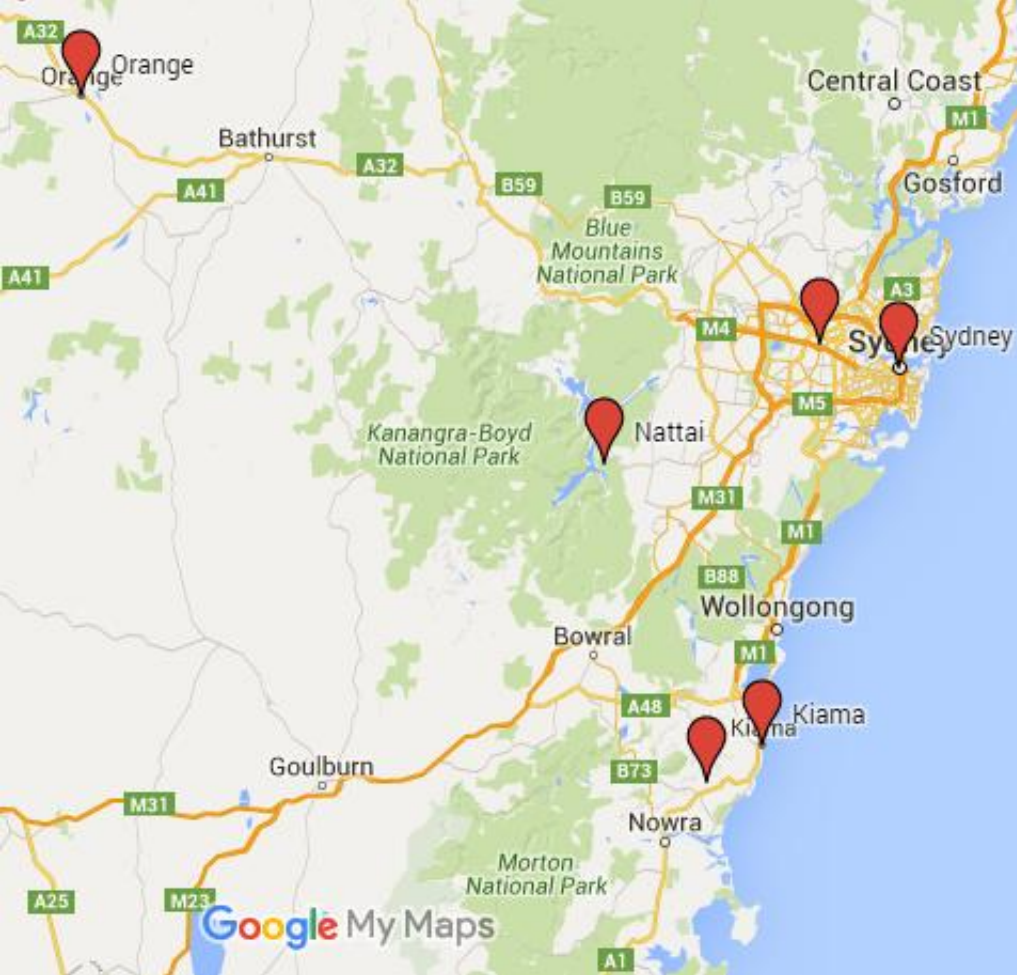

## QUEENSLAND GOVERNMENT EMIGRATION OFFICES, LONDON EMIGRATION TO QUEENSLAND. FREE GRANTS OF LAND.

A NEW EMIGRATION ACT, recently passed, entirely removes the restrictions as to age, which formerly required that men should be under 40 and women under 35. All persons paying their own full passages to the Colony will now receive a full £30 Land Order—equal to 30 Acres of Land, to be selected by themselves—for each member of their families counted as adults. Persons of twelve years and upwards are counted as adults; those between twelve months and twelve years are reckoned as children. Two children count as one adult. Children receive £15 Land Orders.

Free and Assisted Passages are now given to eligible persons without restriction as to age.

# Interesting Developments

- ▶ Son John dies in Brisbane Apr 1866
- ▶ Daughter Georgina born Brisbane Jan 1867
- ▶ Family disappears after Sep 1869 (another daughter was born but birth could not be located)
- ▶ Disappearance = family skeleton!
- ▶ And a new surname



# Why the surname change?

**JOHN CARNEGIE** was brought up at the Central Police Court yesterday, charged with assaulting William Hays, a cab-driver, in Edward-street, on Wednesday, at 11 p.m. It appears that Hays was standing in the street outside Dinsdale's Hotel, when a quarrel took place between him and the defendant, in the course of which Carnegie struck Hays on the face with an old worn-out chisel. He inflicted a cut over the eye. On hearing the evidence, the Police Magistrate found Carnegie guilty, and sentenced him to two months' imprisonment.

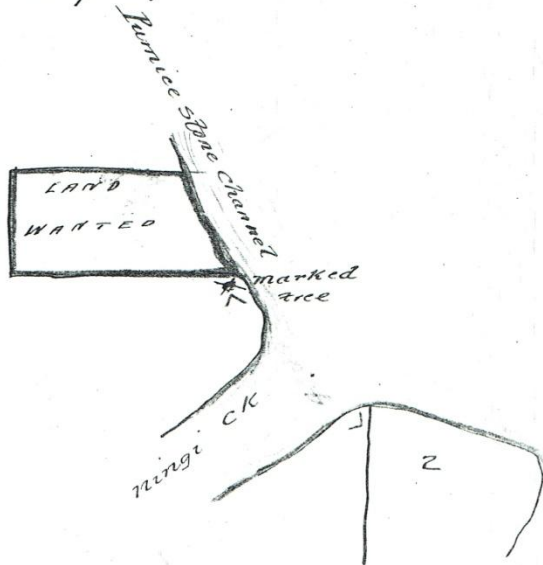

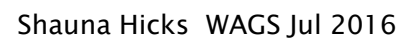

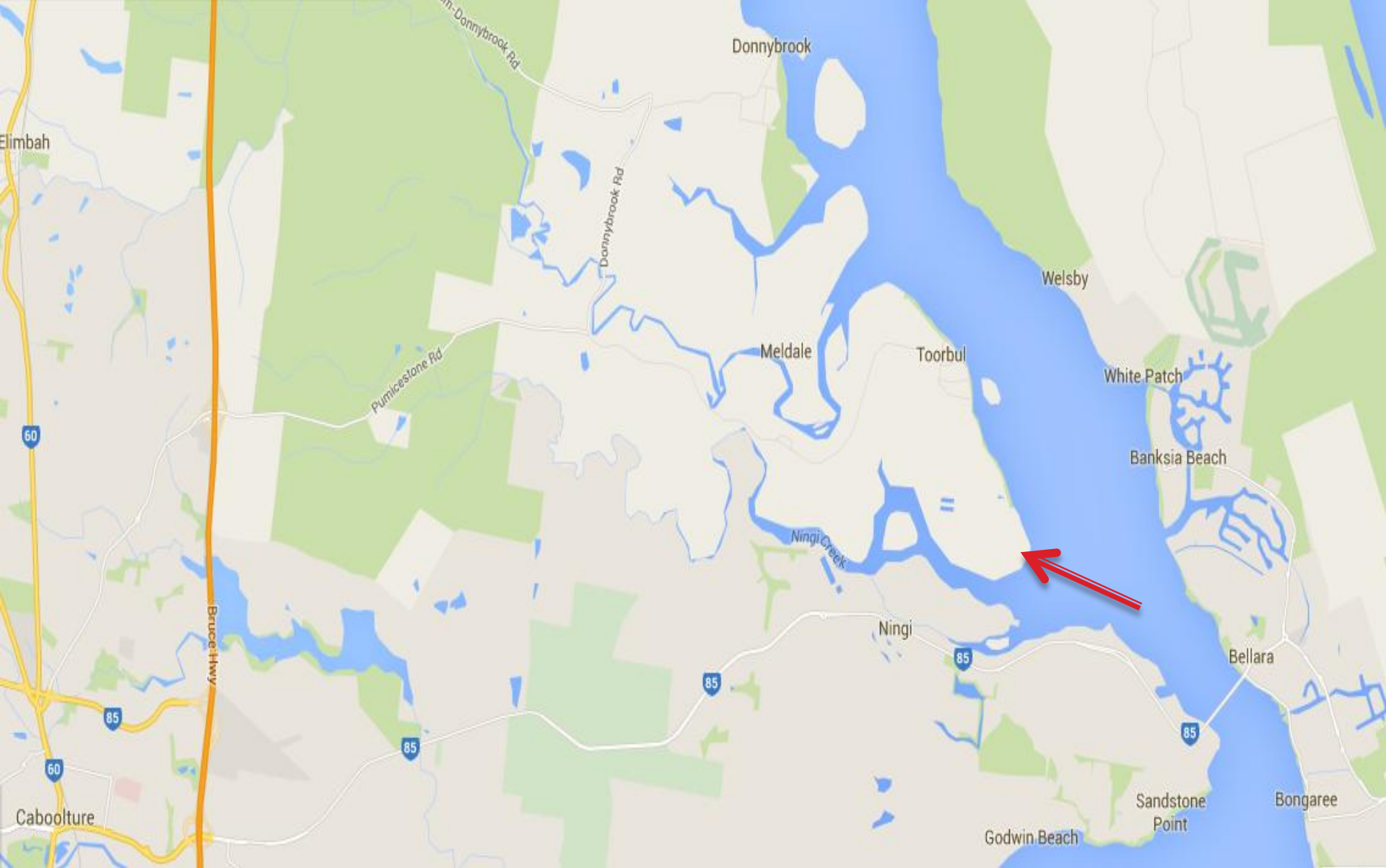

## George Bishop Causeway

Up until the late 1890's Toorbul could only be accessed by boat. To the west, Toorbul was bounded by a tidal area with "waste deep" mud that provided an effective barrier to road.

Eventually growth within the district highlighted the need for a road connection across the tidal flats. Local identity Mr George Bishop and his sons were commissioned around 1900 to construct a causeway and paid the sum of £40.

It is unclear if the money was equally contributed by four local residents, Mr George Bishop, Mr N. Freeman, Mr John Carnegie and one other unidentified resident or whether a formal contract was entered into with the *Caboolture District Board*, a forerunner of Caboolture Shire Council.

George Bishop commenced the task by cutting tea-tree logs and laying them side by side across the mud to form a base for the road. This style of construction was not uncommon with the end product known as corduroy road.

Drains were dug along both sides of the tea-tree base, with the material being used as a fill on top of the logs. Hollow logs were used to cater for tidal water movement.

The road was completed by carting in additional soil by horse and dray.

While the construction technique was simple, it was effective. Up until 1958 there were reports from residents that the tea-tree logs were still in place and in good order.

This sign has been erected in recognition of the pioneering efforts of George Bishop and his sons.

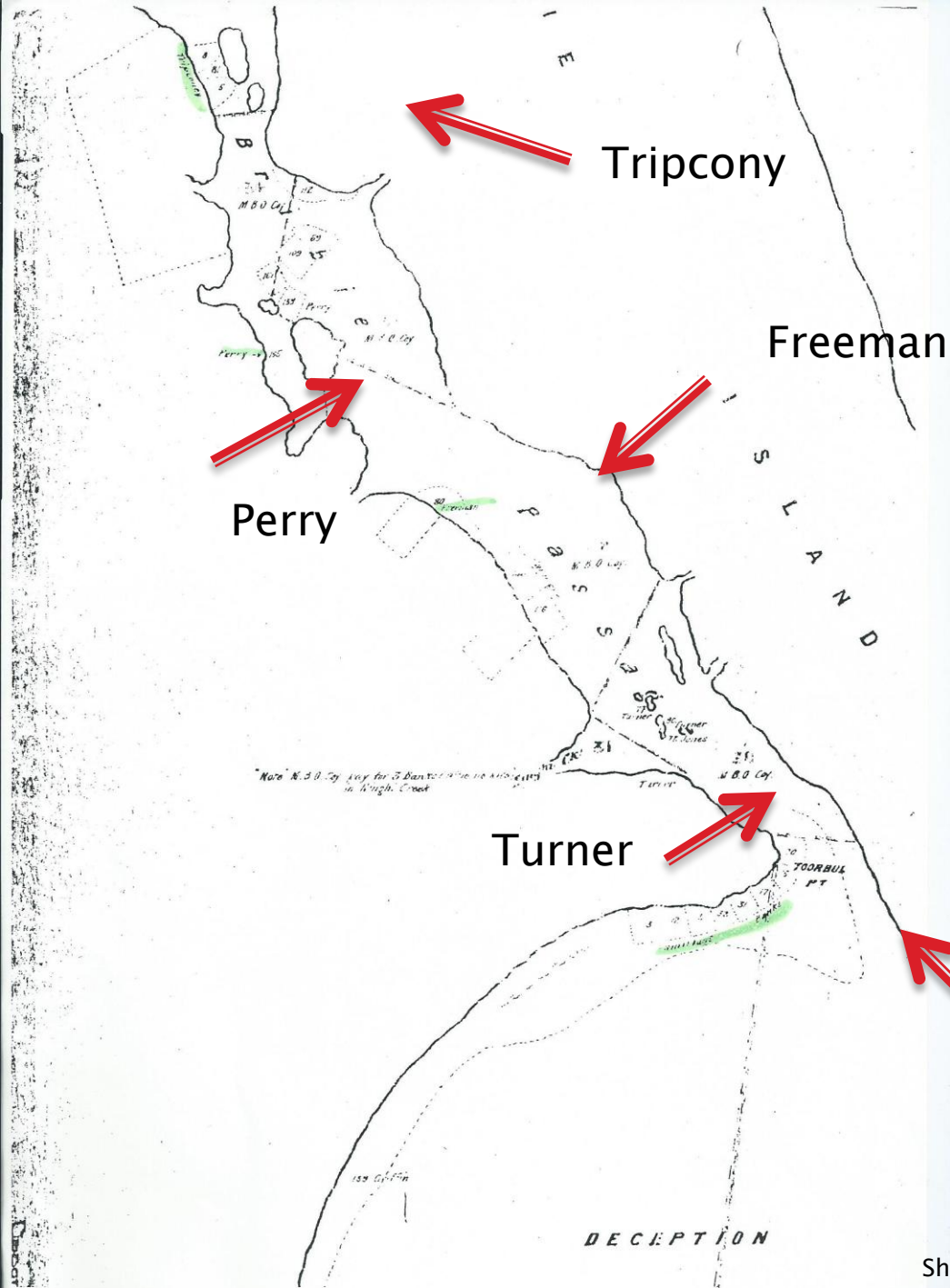
# Oyster Cultivation @ Bribie

- ▶ Queensland Government *Votes & Proceedings* 1884–1891, 1900
- ▶ 1884 John Carnegie holds two banks north of Ninghi Creek, 'has gone to extraordinary labour on his selection digging drains and embankments. He has about 500 bags on it'.
- ▶ 1885 John Carnegie approx 1,000 bags, Jones 1,000 bags, Hamilton Brothers 3,000 bags, Tripcony 200 bags, MBO Coy 500, Turner 1,000 bags, Freeman 500 bags

# Oyster Cultivation @ Bribie

- ▶ 1886 John Carnegie holds 3 banks north of Ninghi Creek, has gone to considerable trouble with the cultivation of his oyster banks, and on being informed of whelk tingle by Mr Carr, he with his children (Clara 14, James 6), collected several cwt of whelk tingles off his banks. He also has stones and stakes laid down for the catchment of spat.
- ▶ 1888 Mills, Turner, Carnegie and Jones have a large amount of cultivation but few marketable oysters –the borer, or whelk tingle, is very plentiful in Ninghi Creek – pierces and kills young oysters





Oyster leases are numbered and marked on the map.

Only bank draft, bank notes, cheque marked by the banker, post-office order, or gold will be accepted for deposits.

Plan and Specification, General Conditions of Contract, and Conditions of Tendering may be seen, and form of Tender with particulars obtained, at the Government Architect's Office, Brisbane.

## A GOLDFIELDS MYSTERY. SUPPOSED SUICIDE.

Perth. May 27

The dead body of a man with the throat cut was found about 150 yards from the Colgardie-road, three miles out from Southern Cross, by a teamster named William Hughes, on Friday last. The body, which was partly dressed, appeared to be that of a man about thirty years old. It was lying on its back, with a folded tent under the head, and a razor was found alongside it. From appearance it is thought to be a case of suicide. The body was much decomposed, and must have been dead about a month. The features were unrecognisable. Among the effects the only clue at present to identification is a letter from Beachport headed "My dear son," and signed "Your affectionate father, Thomas Davis."

BRISBANE.—Charles Davis is charged, on warrant issued by the Brisbane Bench, with having, on the 10th February last, deserted his child, John Carnegie, residing at Toombul. Description:—A seaman or wharf labourer, an Englishman, 31 years of age, 5 feet 4 inches high, stout build, blue eyes, brown beard and hair, fair complexion, strong fair moustache, bald spots under chin, deformed nail on the middle finger of one hand. Supposed to have gone to Western Australia.—O. 841. 21st May, 1894.

## Sewn In A Sail

A story is told which illustrates the unbreakable spirit of our early pioneers. The words are few and simple, yet the story contains deep sorrow, resolute determination and a fortitude of spirit which is felt rather than written.

The story is told by a niece who lived for some time in one of Mrs Clara Bishop's cottages at Toorbul and heard it first hand from her aunt. Several old residents of Toorbul remember the tragic happening.

Clara Carnegie's first marriage was to a Mr. Davis, about whom little is known. They had two sons, Alec and John (Jack). When the "Black Flu" as described by Ernie Bonney claimed its victims soon after World War 1, it reached into the isolated settlements along Pumicestone Passage. Alec Davis died of the "Black Flu".

Then, and this is reported from several sources, the authorities in Caboolture refused to handle the body unless it was closely wrapped to guard against contagion.

Clara Davis sewed her son's body in a sail. She drove a spring cart along the bush track into Caboolture in the dead of night and left the body in Carmody's buggy shed to await a doctor's certificate.

In those days the buggy shed served as a morgue more than once, but that night it must have covered human grief and human courage beyond mortal measure.

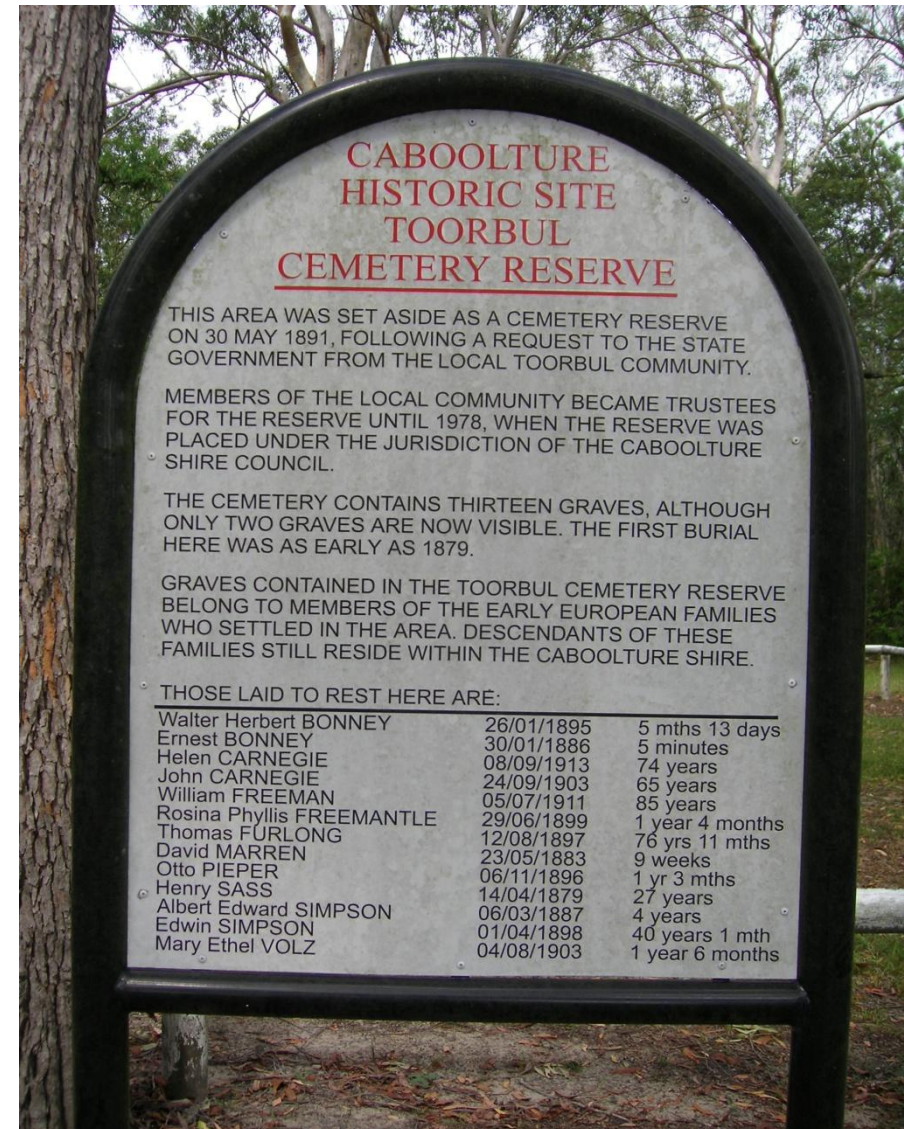

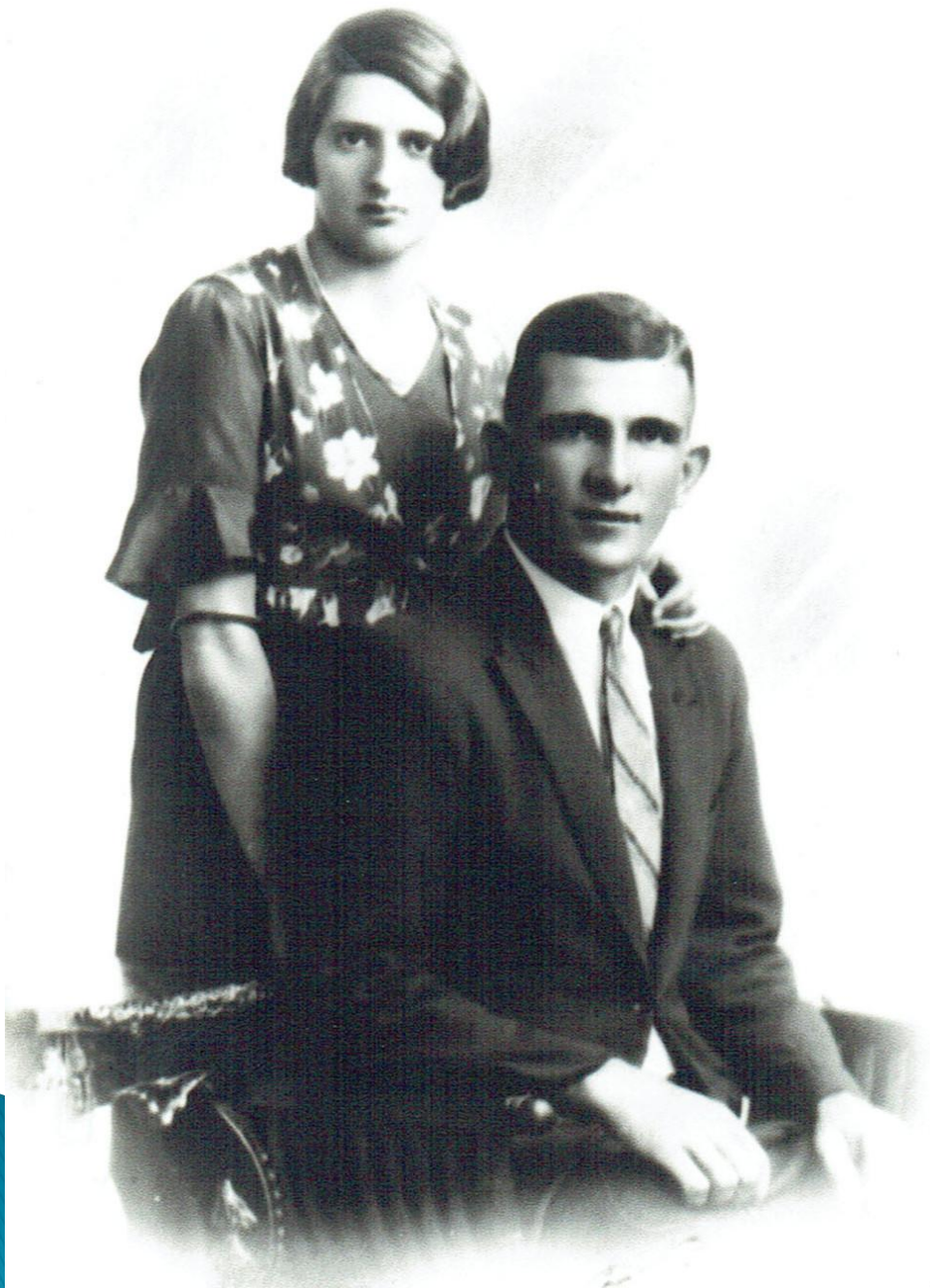
