WHAT IS RYERSON?

The Ryerson Index is a free index to death notices appearing in Australian newspapers. The date range covered extends from the *Sydney Gazette* of 1803 up to newspapers published within the last week or so. The Index also includes many funeral notices, and some probate notices and obituaries.

In 2020, we commenced indexing notices from Funeral Directors' websites. This was in response to the mass closures of regional newspapers which occurred in the second quarter of 2020.

Because the Index was originally created by the Sydney Dead Persons Society, its strength lies in notices from NSW papers - including in excess of two million notices from the *Sydney Morning Herald* alone. However, the representation from sources in other states continues to grow, with additional papers and funeral directors being regularly added, so that the Index can now truly be considered an Australian index.

Indexing is being continuously carried out by a team of volunteers, too numerous to mention individually, who give freely of their time to ensure the site continues to grow. Site updates generally occur weekly.

The index itself cannot by definition be considered a primary source of data, but is purely a research aid to direct the researcher to the original source of a notice. We at Ryerson cannot undertake genealogical research for you, we are too busy indexing!

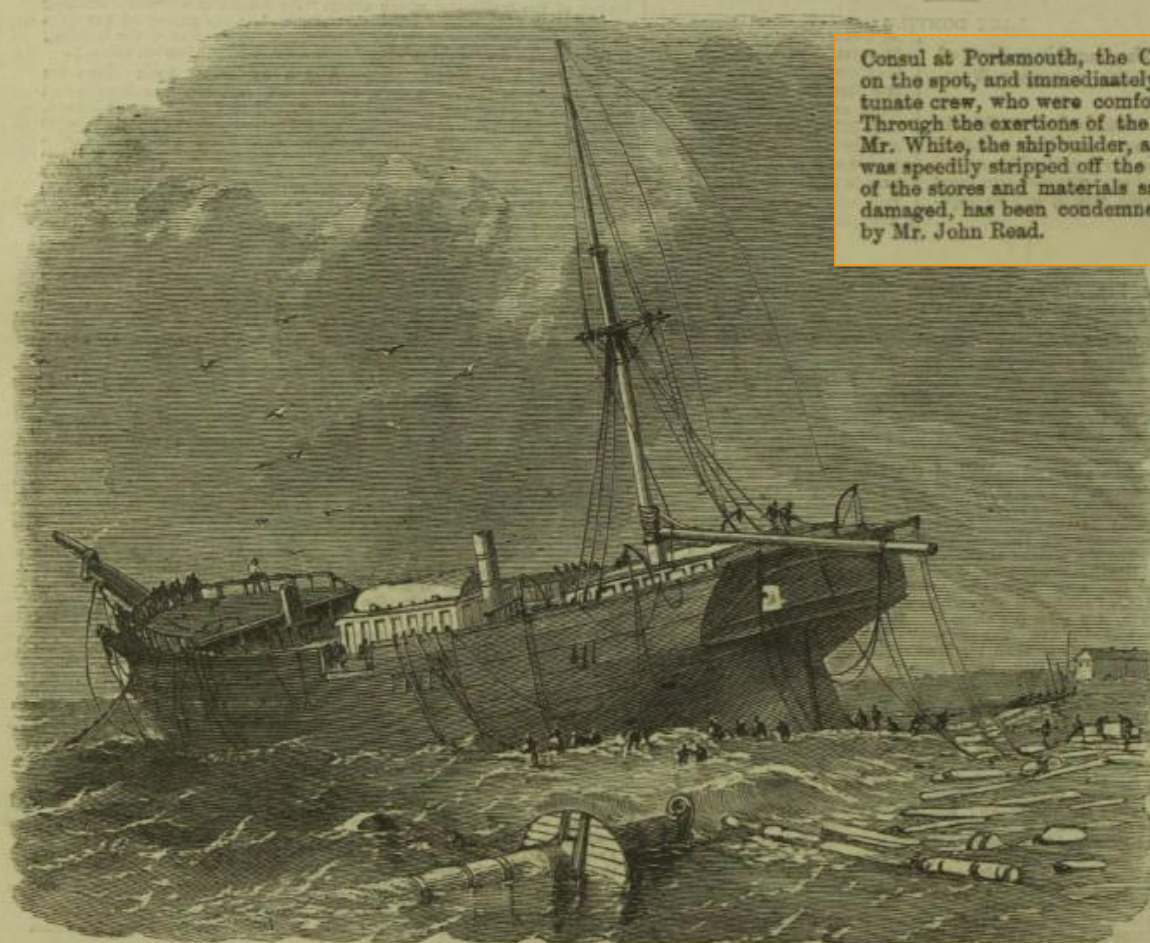

THIS ill-fated vessel went on shore in Bracklesome Bay, near Chichester, in the hurricane of Sunday, the 23rd ult. Immediately on the vessel being observed by the coast-guard every assistance was rendered by them, under the able superintendence of Commander Woolaston, of the Cockbush station. The crew were landed in their own boats with much difficulty, the chief officer with two of the men being precipitated into the sea by the fouling of the tackle in lowering, but were rescued by the coast-guard. 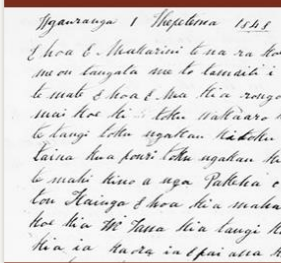

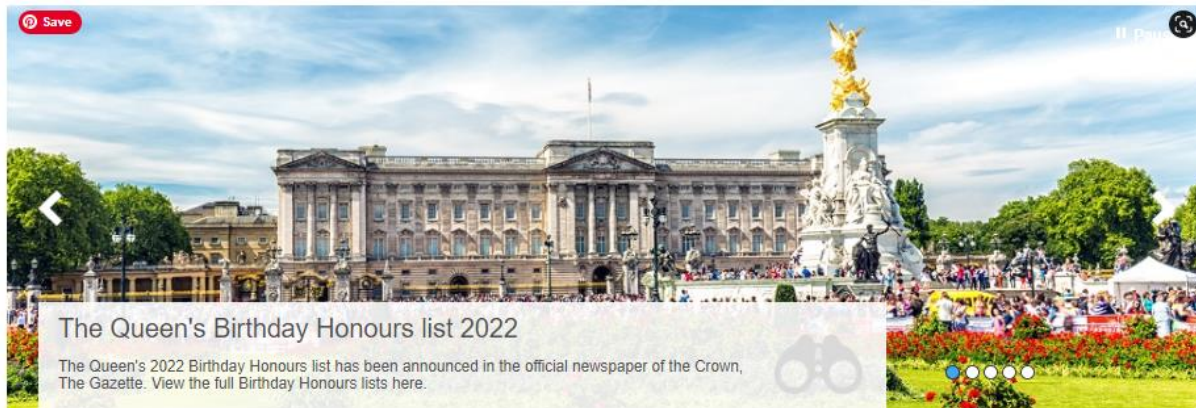

WE are now certainly informed of the *Mary* Yacht being cast away, as she was coming from Ireland, by two persons that escaped from on board her, who relate these particulars; That the 25 instant about two a clock in the morning, the weather being very foggy, the Yacht touched upon a Rock, to the N.W. of the *Sherris*, a small Isle to the Eastward of *Holyhead Bay*, the Stepmen and Passengers being most of them snuggled under Deck; the first touch roused the Seamen, who looking about, cried, All is well; but presently after the Yacht struck again on another Rock, and there stuck, so near the *Sherris*, that when the Sea made the Vessel royl, the Mast touched the Land, by which only means, those that were preserved, escaped: The Earl of *Meath*, and about 34 more perished in the Yacht, of which number were the Captain, whose name was *Burstow*, the Boatswain, and two ordinary Seamen; the Master, 23 Mariners, and 15 Passengers, got upon the Isle, and so were saved; among these 15 Passengers were the Earl of *Arglofs*, and the Lord *Ardee*, Son and Heir to the Earl of *Meath*: That about noon, on the said 25, the Mast gave way; that the Captain endeavouring to save the Earl of *Meath*, and the rest, lost himself. That those that were preserved, were on the Isle, which is about a League from shore, from Thursday morning, till Saturday afternoon. That with a Steel and a little Gunpowder, they struck fire, and made a fire of the wreck boards of the Yacht, by which they roasted some Mutton, they found on the Isle, which is uninhabited, but had no Bread, nor any liquor, but salt Water, till Providence cast ashore a Runler of *Ulsquebaugh*, which they divided among them; that at last a small Vessel of *Bewmoris*, came and fetched them off, and landed them on Sunday morning at *Bewmoris*. This is the most particular account we have of this sad accident.

Venice, March 23. Our Letters from Constantinople of the 17 February, tell us, of the great preparations that are making at *Adrianople* for the celebrating the Ceremony of the Circumcising the Sultans eldest Son, and the marrying his daughter to one of his Favorites. That there seemed a great disposition for the making a Peace with the Crown of Poland, which the general opinion is will be concluded before the season be fit for the Armies to take the Field. Yesterday in the evening parted from hence towards *Zante* the General Priuli. We are told that the Senate hath refused to grant passage through the Gulf to certain Spanish Troops designed to have been embarked at *Trieste*, and thence transported for *Sicily*, to be employed against *Messina*. Yesterday the Secretary of the Embassy of France, had Audience of the Senate, to acquaint them that the most Christian King had accepted of the Mediation of this State.

Marseilles, April 3. This day we received advice of the arrival of Monsieur *Ducaneat* *Toulon* with five Men of War from *Messina*, and that he brings an account of the farther successes of the French in those parts, viz. That they had taken the *Scalotta*, *Galana*, and *Melazzo*, being Ports of very great importance, but adds, that the *Messineses* begun to be again in some want of Provisions; The Gallies and Men of War that are sitting here and at *Thoulon*, will therefore be haltered with all the diligence possible, the first are ready to sail, and expect only a fair wind.

Vienna, March 24. On Monday last the Count of *Walddeck* parted hence on his return for *Holland*, very well satisfied with the success he has had in the several Matters he came to negotiate in this Court. On Thursday last arrived here the Marquis of *Borgomano*, being dispatched by the Duke of *Villa Hermosa*, Governor of the Spanish Netherlands, to give, as we are told, his Imperial Majesty a particular account of the present posture of things in those Countreys, and to pray him to hasten his Army into the Field. The Count de *Montecuculi* has already received a very great sum of Money, and this week he is receiving more.

COOPER V. WHITE.

This was a case in which the plaintiff sued the defendant for £41, on account of the sale of three cows and two calves. Mr. Hill appeared for the plaintiff and Mr. Nodder for the defendant. Mr. Hill, in opening the case, said he should, as far as he could, anticipate the defence which might be offered on the other side, and asked for a will of the defendant's father to be produced. In the year 1849 Robert White, the father of the defendant, was in possession of a house and some land at Farley, consisting of about 13 acres, and on the 23rd of March that year he executed a will whereby he bequeathed the house and land and two other cottages and gardens to his wife for life, and then to his son. He proceeded to say he also gave her his stock of cows, pigs, etc., and everything he had during her life for her support and after her decease what was left was to go to his son, Robert White. He constituted his wife sole executrix. In 1851 the testator died without having revoked the will, and it was proved on the 30th April, 1852. About five years after the testator's death it was discovered that the last life in the property had dropped, and Mrs. White had to pay five years' back rent. Twelve years after her late husband's death she married the plaintiff, Mr. Cooper, and was then in possession of two milch cows and a heifer in calf, but whether these cows and heifer came to her under her husband's will he didn't know; perhaps the defendant would show. At the time of the marriage plaintiff was not aware of the will, and believed everything belonged to his wife. On one occasion he himself paid £7 10s. 0d., half the rent, out of his own money. He was in possession of some property at Redlynch which produced from £12 to £15 a year, and but for that the stock must have been sold to pay the rent. In the course of time the cows had calves, one of which was kept and the others sold. Becoming barren the two cows which were in the possession of the plaintiff's wife when he married her were sold for £7 2s. 0d., and the heifer, which died of cattle disease, was sold for 18s., so he contended that there was an end of the stock derived from the former husband. Shortly after the two cows and heifer had been disposed of the plaintiff bought a cow in Salisbury market for £9, bred two cows from her, and sold her for £9. When the

two cows from her, and sold her for £9. When the plaintiff's wife died on December 31st, 1876, plaintiff had three cows all in calf. On the same evening that the plaintiff's wife died the defendant entered the house, claimed everything, and declared his intention to remain there till all was settled. The plaintiff, who was 84 years of age, put up with the intrusion. The funeral took place on the 4th of January, and when it was over the clergyman read the will, and gave it as his opinion that everything belonged to the defendant. The plaintiff said he knew the furniture belonged to the defendant, but that the cows were his own. The defendant sold the cows for £41, and having been advised as to his right the plaintiff claimed the full amount for which the cows were sold.

The plaintiff was sworn, and said he was in his 84th year. He married Mrs. Christian White 14 years ago, when she was in the occupation of a small farm, on which there were two milch cows and a heifer. When the cows were barren he sold them for £7, and the heifer for 18s. They spent the money. He bought a cow in Salisbury for £9, and bred three or four calves from her. One of the cows on the farm when his wife died was the produce of the old ones, and Mr. Musell had it. Witness paid the rent. When his wife died Robert came and took possession, and Mr. Messenger read the will.

Mr. Hill: What did the clergyman say?

His Honour: We can't have a clergyman's opinion on a matter of law (laughter).

In cross-examination by Mr. Nodder the witness said his wife had not four cows when he married her, and there was not a calf. His wife died last December, and Robert paid the funeral expenses. He sold some things to Robert, and also some other things besides those he sold to him. Before the will was read he did not know that his wife had only a life interest in the property: if he had he didn't think he should have married the widow (laughter). It was rather an expensive marriage.

Mr. Nodder: It didn't turn out a good bargain?

Witness: It didn't turn out so well as I thought it would (laughter).

Mr. Nodder: Did you ever offer to take £15 in settlement of everything?—No.

Have you ever taken out administration to your wife?—No.

No other witness was called for the plaintiff.

Mr. Nodder submitted that his friend Mr. Hill had made out no case whatever. At all events if there was anything he had to answer it was effectually answered under the will. It seemed to him to remove beyond doubt almost that this widow whom the plaintiff married only took a life interest in this property. He should show his Honour, if necessary, that at the time of the testator's death there were four cows on this property. His friend Mr. Hill construed the words of the will into an absolute gift, and they were to take no notice of the words "for her life."

His Honour: It is very loosely worded. It seems to me that under the terms of that will if it had been necessary to sell the whole of the stock for her support she might have done it.

Mr. Nodder said, granting that, it was not necessary it should be done, as was proved, because the old gentleman had just said that the object in getting rid of the old cows was to get new ones for the support of himself and his wife. And there were two other objections. In the first place if the plaintiff was entitled to sue at all he could only sue as administrator to his wife, but he had not taken administration to his wife.

His Honour: He says it is his own property.

Mr. Nodder contended that the fresh cows being brought on the premises was only a renewal of the property of the former husband, and it was an ordinary case of a tenant for life. A tenant for life was bound to keep up the property, whatever it consisted of.

His Honour remarked that there were the important words "if anything is left," showing that the property was to be subject to her use.

Mr. Nodder said there was one cow left, and at all events he was entitled to that.

His Honour admitted that he was entitled to what was left, but there was only one of these four cows traceable.

Mr. Nodder argued that it was not necessary for the plaintiff's wife to sell the cows which were in her possession, because she had a husband who could keep her, and she was bound to leave them. Then there was a third point. They were certainly liable for her debts; but here the husband walked out very coolly and left the wife's son to pay the funeral expenses.

His Honour remarked that the husband was liable to pay them.

Mr. Nodder contended that the plaintiff was not to take this property and leave the son to pay the funeral expenses, and again said when the fresh cows were placed on the farm it was simply replacing the original stock, which passed to the son under this will. He also referred to the fact that the total estate left by the former husband amounted to £280 18s.

His Honour, however, looking at the time the former husband had been dead thought there had been plenty of time for Mrs. White to dispose of that amount, and said he thought the plaintiff was only entitled to the value of one cow.

Mr. Hill stated it was not in evidence that any of the cows mentioned had been the property of the testator, but they had it in evidence that there were certain cows when the plaintiff married this woman, and he contended that the case broke down. The cows which the husband left might have been sold, and those the plaintiff came into possession of when he married might have been hers. The last clause in a will governed the whole, and therefore the clause as to what was left governed all that went before it. There was no trust whatever, and they said the woman had an undoubted right to dispose of the whole property left by her husband if she liked.

His Honour gave a verdict for the plaintiff for the amount claimed, with costs, but Mr. Nodder said he should appeal.

QUEENSLAND GOVERNMENT EMIGRATION OFFICES, LONDON EMIGRATION TO QUEENSLAND. FREE GRANTS OF LAND.

A NEW EMIGRATION ACT, recently passed, entirely removes the restrictions as to age, which formerly required that men should be under 40 and women under 35. All persons paying their own full passages to the Colony will now receive a full £30 Land Order—equal to 30 Acres of Land, to be selected by themselves—for each member of their families counted as adults. Persons of twelve years and upwards are counted as adults; those between twelve months and twelve years are reckoned as children. Two children count as one adult. Children receive £15 Land Orders.

Free and Assisted Passages are now given to eligible persons without restriction as to age.

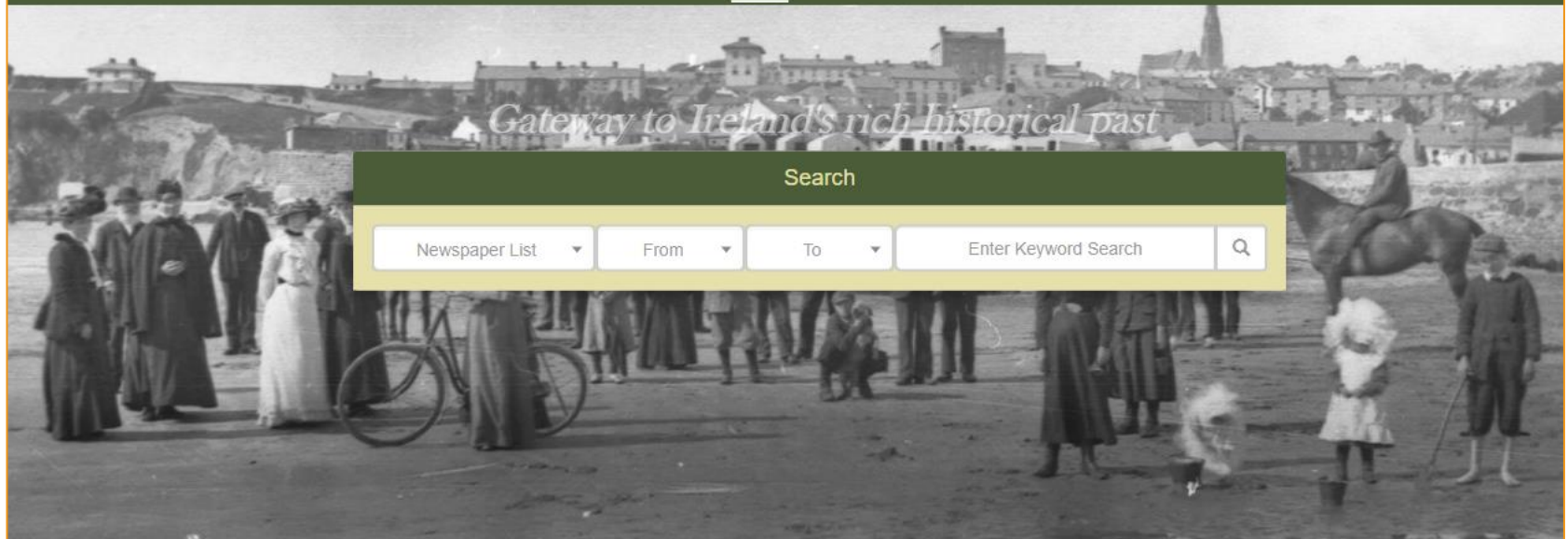
DEATH AND FUNERAL OF MR. EDWIN POLLARD

As reported in our Brackley edition last week, the death occurred at Croughton on Monday, March 16th, of Mr. Edwin Pollard at the age of 62 years. He was a native of the village but at an early age went to London, and for 45 years worked in the Royal Dockyard, Woolwich. On his retirement since the war he returned to his native village, and the funeral took place there on Friday last. Surviving are the widow, six sons and one daughter. 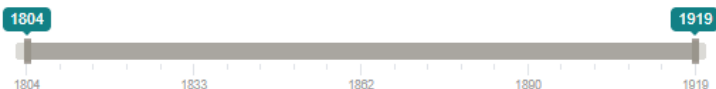
